President's Piece for Peace

On July 9–14, The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod met in convention in Milwaukee. As conventions go, I am more of one who endures them rather than looks forward to them. With that said I will say that this convention was probably the most productive and fruitful convention I have ever participated in. The topics of discussion and resolution were theological in nature and practical in application. There were 18 floor committees so that each committee could work with fewer resolutions allowing for more precise and accurate material. Over all I was very impressed by the presentations, floor discussions of the delegates, and general direction of the Synod on theological matters.

Conventions are divided into three categories. The three are elections, essayists, and resolutions. As far as elections were concerned, the entire presidium was re-elected. I have worked with these men for many years now and find them to be very qualified. They each possess great theological wisdom with compassionate hearts for Christ and His Gospel to be preached to the world. The new Secretary of Synod (Ray Hartwig is retiring) is John Sias from Montana. He is a skilled young man in theology and the handbook. I think he will fill this position very well.

The essayists all worked with the theme “Upon this Rock”. The speakers were from inside and from outside of our Synod. One of them was a Roman Catholic who spoke about the social and political decay of our nation. He was very interesting and invoked the Church to stand on Christ the Rock on more than one occasion. Over all I was pleased with the essays and learned from them.

The resolutions of any convention are always interesting and at times can be a bit contentious. The tenor of the discussions was quite civil—even in the midst of contrary views. Emotions were kept in check for the most part as biblical theology oversaw the rational and reason for supporting or not supporting a particular resolution. The Office of the Ministry received a great deal of discussion and was overwhelmingly supported by the assembly. Divine Service, liturgy, preaching, hymnody, the Lord’s Supper, and good order in the Church were discussed. Again, by large margins, the assembly voted for continuity, consistency, and confessional standards to govern the worship of Christ by His Church.

As optimistic as I am about the Synod in convention, it by no means indicates that our work is going to be any easier. If one message came through loud and clear it was that the society in which we live is no longer tolerant of Christianity. In fact, it is increasingly anti-Christian. Our only hope remains where it always has been. It is in Christ Jesus, the Solid Rock upon which we stand, that the wind and waves of persecution will not overcome us. The gates of hell will not and cannot prevail against Christ and His Church.

The direction and wisdom that came from this convention places us upon the ramparts of He who did everything necessary to secure our salvation. Just as His suffering and death was followed by the glorious resurrection, our lives are buried with Him in baptism only to be raised again to a new life that stands secure by faith in He who defeated sin, death, and the devil. As conventions of Synod go, I was blessed to have attended and participated. I pray the fruits of this labor will manifest faithfulness to God’s Word and fidelity to the Lutheran Confessions. Therein is our hope and stay. Upon this Rock we shall stand. Upon this Rock we are secure unto eternal life.

A number of years ago my oldest daughter gave me a coffee mug from a school that I have a degree from. The schools' insignia was printed on the cup. Over the years the dishwasher has begun to wear the insignia off of the mug. Compare that cup with crystal glassware where an insignia is etched. The former so often fades while the etched will endure for a long time.

It reminded me of the words of the hymn, "On My Heart Imprint Your Image" (LSB 422). Johann Heermann wrote:

*"On my heart imprint Your image,
Blessed Jesus, King of grace,
That life's riches, cares, and pleasures,
Never may Your work erase;
Let the clear inscription be:
Jesus, crucified for me,
Is my life, my hope's foundation,
And my glory and salvation!"*

That is what the Liturgy of the Church does for us as well. Standing at the altar of St. Paul's Chapel in Iowa City I found myself singing the liturgy from DS III which I had learned as a child from TLH. It was imprinted upon my heart. That is precisely what the liturgy can and does do for the believer.

There is little learned, nothing kept, and nothing etched upon the heart in the big-screen settings in some churches. When things change week after week little is learned and taken to heart, is anything even remembered? Children are lucky if they even learn the Lord's Prayer yet alone what Christ Jesus has done for them and what He gives them in the liturgy.

Why churches have deserted the liturgy is beyond me. Praise songs teach very little and in some cases are filled with false doctrine. Edward Mote wrote:

*"My hope is built on nothing less Than Jesus' blood and righteousness;
No merit of my own I claim But wholly lean on Jesus' name.
On Christ, the solid rock I stand; All other ground is sinking sand." - LSB 575:1*

That solid rock comes to us in the liturgy. What comfort that liturgy gives to someone who is on their deathbed. It speaks of Christ and it bespeaks us righteous. Mote wrote:

*"When darkness veils His lovely face, I rest on His unchanging grace;
In every high and stormy gale My anchor holds within the veil." - LSB 575:2*

What a joy and privilege it is to be anchored to Christ Jesus. What a joy to receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament each Lord's Day in the Divine Service. Nikolai Grundvig wrote:

*"Here stands the font before our eyes, Telling how God has received us.
The altar recalls Christ's sacrifice And what His Supper here gives us.
Here the sound the Scriptures that proclaim Christ yesterday, today, the same,
And evermore, our Redeemer.*

*Grant, then, O God, Your will be done, That, when the church bells are ringing,
Many in saving faith may come Where Christ His message is bringing;
"I know My own; My own know Me.
You, not the world, My face shall see. My peace I leave with you. Amen." LSB 645:4-5.*

I thank God that the liturgy has been firmly etched upon my heart. I thank God that I can come to the Divine Service and receive Christ's gifts of forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation, as those gifts are from Christ Jesus Himself.

O Taste and See...

*I am the living bread that came down from heaven.
If anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever.
John 6:51*

What's your favorite "junk" food? True confession. There are some kinds of junk food I like and some I don't. One of my favorites is potato chips - the kettle cooked variety because they are crunchier. What I really like to do is dig in the bag for the chips that are curled over because they are even crunchier!



At the other end of the food spectrum is health food. This is food that helps us get and stay healthy like fruits, vegetables, and whole grains just to name a few. We know that eating the right kind of foods is supposed to help us grow, stay fit, and feel better as long as we follow the recommended guidelines.

As Christians, we know that in order to be spiritually healthy we need to eat the right spiritual food. John tells us that Jesus is that "living bread" that has come down from heaven. Teachers and students in our Lutheran schools and preschools "taste and see" the love and forgiveness that has come to us through the gift of God's Son every day.

In our Lutheran schools and preschools, our teachers get to teach our students that Jesus comes to us through baptism, Holy Communion, and the Bible. Classroom devotions, religion classes, chapels, and prayers are some of the wonderful ways in which Jesus comes to us through His Word. Math, science, and social studies classes also give teachers the opportunity to help students grow spiritually fit as they learn how Christ is present in these subjects as well. Lutheran schools and preschools also equip and fortify students so they are excited to share the Christ with others, too. Each day in a Lutheran school is like a smorgasbord of opportunities to learn and grow as believers in Christ.

Having the opportunity to hear about Jesus everyday is a blessing and not to be taken for granted. Even in Lutheran schools and preschools, Satan is hard at work tempting us to turn from Him and making or replacing it with something else more important. Sometimes that silver platter of sin and doubt can look mighty tempting. Selfish attitudes, bullying, tempers, dishonesty, and a financial commitment are just some of the meal replacements Satan uses to feed on the junk food of sin. Eating this kind of food might be enjoyable for awhile, but it will not help us be spiritually fit. Nor will it result in the heavenly feast that will one day be ours in heaven which Christ won for us by his death and resurrection. Teachers in Lutheran schools and preschools have the opportunity and responsibility to work with students in love and forgiveness with the proper balance of Law and Gospel.



A new school year is about to start! A feast of opportunities to taste and see that the Lord is good awaits each teacher and student. May each of us feed upon the Bread of Life this school year and beyond until we celebrate the feast of victory that awaits all believers in heaven.


