KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Professor Tim Schumacher is a Lutheran educator and technology integration specialist. The Minnesota South District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) honored Tim as the Educator of the Year in 2003 as he was cited for his accomplishments as a classroom teacher, staff leader, and innovative educational technologist. He has had successful experiences leading and teaching at nearly every level of Lutheran education from elementary to secondary to university. Tim also has served as the director of adult ministry in a Lutheran congregation, and has been a consultant and presenter in a variety of educational settings. Prior to arriving at Concordia-Irvine in 2012, Tim had taught for 4 years at a K-12 Lutheran school in Western Australia.

Keynote 1: **Thursday 9:45 am -** God's Breath - We are children of a God whose mere breath gives life. From the creation and fall of the world to today, God continues to breathe life into a world that is condemned. His God-breathed Word – always relevant, always sufficient – calls us to faith and sustains us in our every vocation. How do we make the most of the opportunities to share this Word of Life with the students in our Lutheran classrooms?

Keynote 2: **Thursday 4:15 pm -** Thoroughly Equipped - Faithful to God's Word, we interpret life experiences differently than "the world." We see God at work in our everyday moments.
