President's Piece for Peace

The month of October gets us thinking about more than just Reformation and Advent. It is the month of circuit forums where preparations for the 2015 Iowa District East Convention begin. I was just talking with our presenter for the conference, the Reverend Randy Golter. He will be speaking on the connection between world missions and the mission of Christ at the local altar. He made me aware of a 2013 publication that would be a good primer for his presentation at convention. I have not read it yet but have read its reviews. It sounds very interesting and I wanted to make you aware of it if you wanted to purchase it and read it for your own edification.

The author is Jack D. Kilcrease. The name of the book is *The Self Donation of God: A Contemporary Lutheran Approach to Christ and His Benefits*. It is published by Wipf & Stock Publishers: ISBN #1620326051. The cost on half.com is around \$37.00. Here is what one review says about the book:

In The Self-Donation of God, Jack Kilcrease argues that the speech-act of promise is always an act of self-donation. A person who unilaterally promises to another is bound to take a particular series of actions to fulfill that promise. Being that creation is grounded in God's promising speech, the divine-human relationship is fundamentally one of divine self-donation and human receptivity. Sin disrupts this relationship and therefore redemption is constituted by a reassertion of divine promise of salvation in the face of the condemnation of the law (Ge. 3:15). As a new effective word of grace, the promise of a savior begins the process of redemption within which God speaks forth a new narrative of creation. In this new narrative, God gives himself in an even deeper manner to humanity. By donating himself through a promise, first to the protological humanity and then to Israel, he binds himself to them. At the end of this history of self-binding, God in Christ enters into the condemnation of the law, neutralizes it in the cross, and brings about a new creation through his omnipotent word of promise actualized in the resurrection.

If that doesn't whet your appetite I don't know what will (except maybe a T-bone steak with baked potato). Kilcrease is saying when God makes a promise He plans out a strategy to keep that promise for the sake of its recipients. He bases his premise on Genesis chapters 1-3. In these chapters God makes things come into being and carries out His work of creation by the spoken Word. It is through the spoken Word that God makes a promise to fallen humanity that He will rescue them from their own death with a savior. From this (along with many other biblical references) Kilcrease concludes that God's Word, when spoken one to another, is where God does His work of seeking and saving the lost.

Kilcrease contends that speaking God's Word is much more than simply conveying information or announcing theological themes connected by theological jargon. He holds to the fact that when God's Word is spoken, God is doing the work of keeping His promise to save the lost and strengthen the found. This work is a work which finds its conclusion in the resurrection.

I am excited to read this book and look forward to the convention speaker next summer. He will assist us in seeing the work of mission around the world is also the work of mission at our local altar. Blessings reading, blessed Reformation festival.

Salvation is in Christ Jesus!

“And he called for lights and rushed in and, trembling with fear, he fell down before Paul and Silas, and after he brought them out, he said, “Sirs, what must I do to be saved And they said, “Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you shall be saved, you and your household.” - Acts 16:29-31

This is the well-known account of St. Paul with the jailer at Philippi. The question which the jailer asked is one that many people may be asking today, what must I do for my salvation? That question unfortunately is flowing from sermons that focus upon all that the Christian must be doing in his or her life and rarely hearing about what has been done for them.

Here is how that works. If you hear one sermon series after another, instead of preaching from the lectionary, you end up with sermons which are all about what you should be doing. This Law is third use Law; we hear very little second use which mirrors and slaps us in the face with our sins. The old Adam continues to be numbed down by the Law while the new person in Christ Jesus begins to starve to death because it is hearing no gospel being proclaimed.

Sermon series are safe in that the Law doesn't usually kill anything. You won't be calling anyone to repentance with that kind of preaching. If something is not killed there is no life to be resurrected by the Gospel. The outcome is that kind of preaching is no longer Christo-centric but focuses on that which we can't do perfectly, so why even bother. Preaching that is not centered in Christ will eventually kill the Church. Why would you want to go to some place where you don't meet the incarnate Christ Jesus?

As for salvation a little ditty that I came up with the other day while driving back from Minnesota is: **‘it's all done, and it's done for you!’** The unbeliever always wants to know what he or she must do. When you tell them it's all been done for them then they are still wondering well, “what's the catch?” We still confront the Roman heresy that you are saved by faith and your works. The consequence of which is no peace or assurance of salvation.

My mother died on September 30th of this year at the age of 95 years and two weeks. Mom was ready to die and to go and be with Jesus. While we miss her, we rejoice that she suffered little in the last days of her life as pneumonia took her life. Our family received a memorial from one of my cousins and her husband. They live in Oregon and are both practicing Roman Catholics. They gave money to the church where I was baptized and also indicated that my mother, LCMS Lutheran all her life, had been enrolled in “perpetual masses.” My brother Daryl, an LCMS Pastor asked, “How should I respond to that?” I simply said, speak the truth in love. If there is one passage they have never read it probably is I John 1:7c, **“And the blood of Jesus His Son cleanses us from all sin.”**

Our family rejoiced in the wonderful fact that the incarnate Christ Jesus had done it all for my mother and had brought His death and resurrection to mom in the waters of Holy Baptism some 95 years ago. It is truly sad that people who confess The Three Ecumenical Creeds of Christendom can have no real hope or peace in their lives because they do not understand **“that it's all done, and it's done for you!”** Thanks be to God for the crucified and risen Savior, Christ Jesus!

Promoting Brain Health

The brain is the most complex part of the human body: this 3-pound organ (in the average adult) is the seat of intelligence, interpreter of the senses, initiator of body movement, and controller of behavior. From its bony shell, it contains about 100 billion nerve cells and trillions of “support cells”. When the brain is healthy, it functions quickly and automatically. But when problems occur, the results can be devastating. About 50 million people in the USA – one of every five – suffer from damage to the nervous system, such as neurogenetic diseases (e.g., muscular dystrophy), developmental disorders like cerebral palsy, degenerative diseases (Parkinson’s, Alzheimer’s), cerebrovascular disease (e.g., stroke, vascular dementia), trauma (e.g., spinal cord or head injuries), convulsive disorders (e.g., epilepsy), infectious diseases (e.g., meningitis) and brain tumors. We may not be able to change our genetic makeup, but a growing body of evidence points to other factors that we can control.... Here are some ways to keep your brain healthy, and prevent or, at least, delay some common “brain-drain” diseases!

1. EAT & DRINK THE RIGHT STUFF! Try the following...

- Fruit or vegetable juices three times a week slashed Alzheimer odds 76% in one study.
- Caffeine – the new brain tonic – found in coffee & tea [NOTE: only brewed tea works: bottled tea lacks the antioxidants]
- Red wine: high in antioxidants, but limit it to one glass a day for women, two for men.
- Fatty fish & liver- high in omega-3 fat, an essential component of your brain... and the retina of your eye!
- AVOID: sugary soft drinks, especially those sweetened with high fructose corn syrup; water with high copper content.

2. FLOSS THOSE PEARLY WHITES - Inflammation in diseased teeth/gums migrates to the brain.

3. GET ACTIVE - Physical and mental exercises help us make and keep new brain cells.

4. PROTECT YOUR HEAD - Wear seat belts and helmets, fall-proof your home, practice balance/flexibility exercises, and don't take unnecessary risks!

5. GET ENOUGH ZZZZZZ's - Sleep is not only essential for regenerating the physical body, but is imperative for problem-solving, memory, creativity and behavior control. Adults, as well as youngsters, benefit from a mid-day nap to boost and restore brainpower.

6. GO TO CHURCH - yes, interactive worship is not only good for the soul... the brain is engaged by the song, prayer, recitation of liturgy, as well as social engagement!

GOLDEN TREASURE TRUTHS

“Behold, Lord, half of my goods I give to the poor. And if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I restore it fourfold.” And Jesus said to him, “Today salvation has come to this house.” Luke 19:8-9

As a “chief tax collector” and “rich” (vs. 2) Zacchaeus treasured possessions and power. Even though Zacchaeus was a traitor, greedy, dishonest, and “a sinner” to his peers in Jericho, Jesus came seeking this “wee little man in the sycamore tree.” Jesus’ mission was to “seek and save the lost.” (vs. 10)

Jesus’ interaction with Zacchaeus is Good News for us as Jesus has come to seek and to save us. For many of us, Jesus found us in our sinful nature and in our parents’ arms at the baptismal font. He washed us and welcomed us to His family. The hymn “Amazing Grace” summarizes our story, “I once was lost but now am found.”

Luke is inspired to also record Zacchaeus’ response to God’s grace. Zacchaeus returns what he had stolen and give half of his goods to the poor. With Jesus as his treasure, Zacchaeus’ perspective on his earthly treasures changes. Zacchaeus is repentant and responsive. As we manage our earthly treasures, we ask, “What’s God’s?” “What’s fair?” “What’s generous?”

Zacchaeus learns that the coins are not the Roman government’s possession nor his own. They are God’s. Jesus taught “render to Caesar.” What had been stolen must be returned. Having obeyed the Seventh Commandment, Zacchaeus moves on to “What’s generous?” He is blessed to move beyond a tithe to give “half my goods to the poor.” God’s grace motivates us to be generous for the sake of His kingdom.
