I had the blessed opportunity to review a book that has recently been published through CPH. It is entitled *Built on the Rock: The Healthy Congregation*. I review many books, some from CPH and others from different publishers. Most are decent books yet lack the basic application for use and life in the parish. Not so with this new book. It is authored by Ted Kober who is the Senior Ambassador of "Ambassadors of Reconciliation". He brings a great deal of experience to the topic of this book.

The concept of the book is to strengthen the health of the congregation. His foundation is very biblical and in a word, common sense. That being said he still offers excellent research to back-up his points and substantiates his conclusions. Ted is a layman, yet a very well catechized one. As such he writes at a level that is interesting to pastors and also understandable by laity. I do recommend this book for the church worker as well as the congregation. I quote for you my review that is in the inside cover of the book:

"I have known Ted Kober for many years, and some of his publications were resourced in my PhD dissertation on reconciliation. He is a man of great detail and once again shows himself to cover every aspect of what a healthy congregation looks like and how it lives out its baptismal regeneration. This book is a basic catechism on the topic of true reconciliation in the parish. Ted uses a plethora of Bible tests to generate his points along with excellent examples from congregations who have exhibited ill health. The two major themes of the book are (1) the more a congregation is in Bible study, the greater opportunity it has to express a healthy witness of the faith, and (2) the congregation that is willing and able to confess its sin to God and the ones they have offended is the one that not only desires forgiveness but also desires to extend it to the repentant."

"Ted spends equal amounts of time addressing the laity and the clergy from each aspect of the two main points. He is fair to each and sound in his applications. I think this book is going to be a great asset to the entire Church, and a blessing to the overall confession of the Lutheran Church, to our neighbor, as well as to the world. Each chapter concludes with Bible study format of questions and discussion topics. I highly recommend it for church and pastor libraries as well as bookshelves in the home of our members."

As we enter the celebration of Thanksgiving to our God for all His blessings, I pray He grant you the power of His Spirit as you preach and teach. May He fill you with His grace and bestow His grace through you to the flock under your care. I am thankful for all of you and consider it an honor to serve alongside you in the marvelous Kingdom of Christ our Lord.

CONFESSING CHRIST JESUS

I was recently given a copy of Ted Kober's new book *Built on the Rock: The Healthy Congregation*. As I write this article I am about half way through the book. One of the emphasis that he makes is describing a healthy congregation by the number of people who are in Bible study. The point that he is making is that, as God's Word permeates our lives it shapes how we deal with one another when conflict arises.

He stresses the importance of Bible study which has a healthy division of Law and Gospel. He spends a lot of time speaking in terms of the need of people to apply confession and forgiveness in their relationships with one another. Instead of imploding upon itself, the church can extend God's forgiveness and the power of the Gospel can do what only it can do, forgive sin and heal brokenness in relationships.

James 5:16 states: *"Therefore, confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The effective prayer of a righteous man can accomplish much."* Our natural tendency when conflict comes is to blame everyone else and never step up and take responsibility for our own actions. Tempers flare, words fly, and the church acts like anyone other than the baptized in Christ Jesus. In small towns everyone thinks that they know what is going on in the troubled congregation and the gossip mill runs rampant, and sometimes even our own members are guilty of contributing to that.

The Church confesses. It begins by confessing its sins. We do that corporately and individually with our Pastor. We read: *"If we say that we have no sin, we are deceiving ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar, and His Word is not in us. And the blood of Jesus His Son cleanses us from all sin."* (I John 1:8-10, 7c). We confess our sins so that we can receive His absolution. As we are absolved we can work at restoring relationships which have been broken through conflict.

In doing so we are confessing Christ Jesus within the body of Christ. That is done by our actions or deeds and in our words. Of that confession, Paul writes: *"that if you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you shall be saved, for with the heart man believes, resulting in righteousness, and with the mouth he confesses, resulting in salvation."* (Romans 10:9-10). The Church is called to confess Christ Jesus to the world and that begins within our congregation.

Not only do we confess our sins in the Divine Service, but we confess Christ Jesus in the creeds and in the receiving of the Lord's Supper. We come to receive God's gifts of forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation, so that we can go forth confessing Christ Jesus through our various vocations. As our Synodical theme for Reformation 500 put it: ***'It's Still All about Jesus!'*** It always has been about Jesus and Luther helped to bring that back into its proper focus. It is still all about Jesus today and it needs to be all about Jesus until He returns on the last day.

In the midst of confessing Christ Jesus, the devil, the world around us, and our own sinful flesh will try to trip us up. As we keep centered in Christ Jesus and His Word and Sacraments we are given His assurance. As Luther states in the hymn, *A Mighty Fortress*:

"The Word they still shall let remain nor any thanks have for it; He's by our side upon the plain with His good gifts and Spirit. And take they our life, Goods, fame, child, and wife, though these all be gone, our vict'ry has been won; The Kingdom ours remaineth."

We have Christ's promise: *"Everyone therefore who shall confess Me before men, I will also confess him before My Father who is in heaven."* (Matthew 10:32).

“For we are the temple of the living God. As God has said: ‘I will live with them and walk among them, and I will be their God, and they will be my people. And, I will be a Father to you, and you will be my sons and daughters, says the Lord Almighty.’” (2 Corinthians 6:16, 18)

A group of wild geese were flying in formation, heading south for the winter. They formed a beautiful V in the sky and were admired by everyone who saw them. (*As an aside, do you know that in such geese formations one leg of the V is longer than the other? Do you know why? Check it out at the end of this article.)



One day, Wally, one of the geese in the formation looked down and saw something that caught his eye. It was a barnyard with a flock of tame geese living there. They were happy geese, waddling around honking merrily, and eating corn that was thrown to them every day. “Wow”, thought Wally, “that sure would be nice to have some corn, and this flying south is very tiring. I’d like to just waddle around down there for a while.”

So, Wally made a sharp dive to the left and headed for the barnyard. He joined the tame geese and started eating corn. The rest of the geese formation continued to fly south, but Wally doesn’t care. “I’ll rejoin them this spring when they are coming back north.”

Sure enough, several months later Wally spots the geese formation headed north. They looked beautiful up there, and by now Wally is a little tired of the barnyard scene. He decides it’s time to leave so he starts flapping his wings furiously and tries to get airborne. Not going to happen since Wally has gained some weight eating all that corn and he hasn’t kept up with his wing exercises. Eventually, he does get off the ground, but he was flying too low and BAM! He slams into the side of the barn. He falls to the ground with a thud, and says to himself, “Oh well, I’ll just wait until they fly south in a few months. Then I’ll rejoin them and become a wild goose again.”

Once again the flock flew overhead heading south for the winter, and Wally tried again to get out of the barnyard. It was to no avail. He just did not have the strength. Every fall and every spring Wally saw the formation come and go, and they would call out to him to come and join them. His attempts at leaving were all in vain. As the years went by, Wally paid no attention to the geese in formation. He had become a barnyard goose.

I could wrap this article up by saying, “Don’t be like Wally and eat too much over Thanksgiving or you won’t be able to fly back to the formation the Monday after Thanksgiving break.” Although, some of you may be thinking, “Hmmm, that’s not a bad idea! I know what I have to get done in my school/classroom and my family between Thanksgiving and Christmas.”

Let’s not pursue the over-eating point to this story, but rather, let’s think about the journey. Like Wally, you’ve been on a journey, too. Your journey has been another (or your first) school year in which you started to prepare long before the first day of school in August. You were busy getting your classrooms ready, making home visits, coaching volleyball or soccer, preparing lessons, taking classes, going to faculty meetings, perhaps moving to a new school, taking on a new position, and many other activities. It’s November, and you’ve still got Christmas and half of 2018 to get through yet. It is a long haul.

It can be very tempting to take the “Wally” approach and just say “Forget it. I give up.” It gives Satan great delight to mess with our thoughts and attitudes and tell us lies about who we are and whose we are. He loves to say, “It doesn’t matter. One handful of corn isn’t going to hurt anything.” Pretty soon, one handful isn’t enough, and we want more of what the old evil Foe has to offer. He loves to work on our hearts so we feel unappreciated, disrespected, empty, and

alone. Living in a fishbowl (or a barnyard) isn't easy, is it?

Our journey, not only for Lutheran educators but for everyone, does not end in November. We know in our hearts and minds that Christ came to purchase and redeem us, a poor sinful being. God chose us as His own, before the world began. St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 6:20 *"For you were bought at a price. Therefore glorify God with your body."*

Consider this the next time you feel like a barnyard goose. Jesus claimed us to be His own sons and daughters, and called us to serve Him until we breathe our last breath. St Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 6:16, 18: *"For we are the temple of the living God. As God has said: 'I will live with them and walk among them, and I will be their God, and they will be my people. And, I will be a Father to you, and you will be my sons and daughters, says the Lord Almighty.'"*

Enjoy this month of November, give thanks, and give a "honk" about who you are and whose you are! With grateful hearts, we say "thank you God" that we are sons and daughters of the Most High!

Holiday Health & Safety Tips

November 2017

The holidays are a great opportunity to enjoy time with family and friends, celebrate life, to be grateful, and reflect on what's important. They are also a time to appreciate the gift of health. Here are some holiday tips to support your efforts for health and safety this season.



Wash your hands often. Keeping hands clean is one of the most important steps you can take to avoid getting sick and spreading germs to others. Wash your hands with soap and clean running water; rub them together for at least 20 seconds. Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. If you don't have tissue, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve or elbow, not your hands



Manage stress. The holidays don't need to take a toll on your health and pocketbook. Keep your commitments and spending in check. Balance work, home, and play. Get support from family and friends. Keep a relaxed and positive outlook. Make sure to get proper sleep.



Get check-ups and vaccinations. Exams and screenings can help find potential problems early, when the chances for treatment and cure are often better. Vaccinations help prevent diseases and save lives. Schedule a visit with your health care provider for needed exams and screenings. Ask what vaccinations and tests you should get based on your age, lifestyle, travel plans, medical history, and family health history. Get health insurance through healthcare.gov if needed.



Watch the kids. Children are at high risk for injuries. Keep a watchful eye on your kids when they're eating and playing. Keep potentially dangerous toys, food, drinks, household items, choking hazards (like coins and hard candy), and other objects out of kids' reach. Learn how to provide early treatment for children who are choking. Make sure toys are used properly. Develop rules about acceptable and safe behaviors, including using electronic media.



Prevent injuries. Most residential fires occur during the winter months. Keep candles away from children, pets, walkways, trees, and curtains. Never leave fireplaces, stoves, or candles unattended. Don't use generators, grills, or other gasoline - or charcoal - burning devices inside your home or garage. Install a smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector in your home. Test them once a month, and replace batteries twice a year.



Eat healthy, and be active. With balance and moderation, you can enjoy the holidays the healthy way. Choose fresh fruit as a festive and sweet substitute for candy. Limit fats, salt, and sugary foods. Find fun ways to stay active, such as dancing to your favorite holiday music. Be active for at least 2½ hours a week. Help kids and teens be active for at least 1 hour a day.

Life Sunday

November 2017

Life Sunday may be observed on the Sunday closest to January 22nd, that horrible day when the United States Supreme Court decided in the Roe V. Wade decision that unborn babies are not worth defending by law. Perhaps Life Sunday would be incorporated better into the life of the Church along with one of the appointed Feasts.

Christmas Eve (December 24th) and **Christmas Day** (December 25th) are obvious opportunities for you to teach and proclaim that our Lord Jesus was born as a tiny, defenseless baby, so long ago, for us and for our salvation. *Father in heaven, grant us grace to proclaim Christmas joy every day, and offer your peace to every mother, father, son, and daughter!*

The Feast of **the Holy Innocents, Martyrs** (December 28th) is a tragic remembrance of the baby boys in Bethlehem who were slaughtered by King Herod. We pray in the Collect for that day: *“Almighty God, the martyred innocents of Bethlehem showed forth Your praise not by speaking, but by dying.” Lord, help us also to make the good confession in our lives as well as with our words, defending innocent babies with our words and with our actions!*

The Feast of **the Annunciation of our Lord** (March 25th) is also a wonderful time to preach into the ears of God’s people that our Savior Jesus was made man, not only at His birth, but nine months prior to that at His conception! We confess in the 2nd Article of the Creed: *And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary.* March 25th is actually Palm Sunday this year. Therefore, **the Annunciation of our Lord** should not be observed that day, but may be transferred to a weekday following the Second Sunday of Easter.

Whenever you observe Life Sunday this year, remember the murder of 1.2 million tiny little unborn babies in the United States every year by elective abortion. Pray for moms, dads, babies, grandparents, friends, and neighbors, that they may speak God’s Word as God gives you opportunity. Help to offer alternatives to abortion in your area. Give a special offering to Lutherans for Life. Most importantly, offer the forgiveness of every sin, including abortion, to everyone, through Jesus Christ our Savior.






