President's Piece for Peace

February 2022

During these days of February we are getting ready for Lent. It's a time of self-reflection and deep conscientiousness. We know that and have been participating in it our entire ministries. Might I suggest an additional contemplation this Lenten Season? It is also a good time to reflect on the fact that we serve where we do and by what authority. As Walther would have us look, it begins with the Call. Where does the Call come from? From whom does the Call come? I often hear congregations and schools say "we sent a Call" to such and such. I know what they mean when they say that but is it as biblically accurate as it should be?

In Acts 1 we are told that the prayer of the assembly was this: "(Lord) Show us which of these two you have chosen." When Paul introduces his first epistle to the Corinthians he says, "called to be an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God." He says much the same thing when writing to the churches of Galatia, "an apostle sent not from men nor by man, but by Jesus Christ and God the Father." Again, in his letters to the Ephesians, Colossians, and II Timothy he says, "an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God." He then uses a little stronger language when writing I Timothy and Titus when he says, "an apostle of Christ Jesus by the command of God our Savior and of Christ Jesus our hope."

There can be no mistake from whom the Call comes. It comes from God Himself. It does not originate with the congregation. If anything, the need originates with the congregation, but the Call is from God through the Church. The scriptures are quite flexible as to how God extends the Call and by what measures He uses through the Church to the recipient.

In Acts 1 He uses the casting of lots (notice, not ballots, but lots). In Acts 6 the brothers of the gatherers were to select seven men who were known to be full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom. Later in Acts 15 it was the congregation who was to select the couriers of the Churchly letter that was sent with answers to theological and practical questions. In Acts 20 Paul explains that the overseers of the congregations were selected and placed by the Holy Spirit. The means are not delineated but the origin is.

When all is gathered from the Word of God on this issue it is clear we serve where we do because this is where God has sent us to serve. It is His will, His command, His choosing that we reside with and among the sheep and students where we have been placed. It's not always easy and sometimes not but on the wisdom and pleasant but it is the Garden of Eden (Walther's term) where the paradise of perfect Word and Sacrament are served.

We do not lean on our own understanding perfection of His Word and Sacraments.

Not only does He place us, but He also gives us the materials with which we serve. Whether it is in the classroom with instruction or in the chancel with preaching and administration, He provides the substance of the ministry. We do not lean on our own understanding but on the wisdom and perfection of His Word and Sacraments. Therein is the authority to preach and teach as well as the strength to carry on in the ministry for the sake of the sheep Jesus died and rose again to save.

God Has Sculpted Us This Year*

February 2022

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God. For just as we share abundantly in the sufferings of Christ, so also our comfort abounds through Christ (2 Cor. 1:3–5).

A young colleague of mine told me back in April, as the pandemic settled heavily upon us, "I will not be the same educator when this is over." An understatement, as it turns out. I know you have tried again and again to orient your hearts to God's sovereignty and perhaps you have done so without that quiet inward reassurance that the Spirit sometimes adds to bolster our faith. Such silence is the sculpting of God.



In these times, you may not have realized it but you have been sharing in the sufferings of Christ. He stood quietly at your side as you sought to trust and obey the Lord despite the darkness and the clamor. That is reason enough for praise.

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God. For just as we share abundantly in the sufferings of Christ, so also our comfort abounds through Christ (2 Cor. 1:3–5).

Christ has not been impervious to your pains and bruises from

the pandemic, politics, or precautions. Jesus surely shared your heartache when you taught from home, or your school was closed, or your students were afraid. He knows how you yearned for a coffee with a co-worker, or a face-to-face conversation with a parent.

The backdrop to your prayers over these months was dark Gethsemane. Jesus knelt there with you, familiar ground to him. Nine times in 2 Corinthians 1 Paul speaks of comfort using the word *paraklesis*, akin to *paraklete*, the Holy Spirit. The God of all comfort does more than telegraph a few verses to us. *The Message* captures it:

He **comes alongside us** when we go through hard times, and before you know it, **he brings us alongside someone else** who is going through hard times so that we can be there for that person just as God was there for us. 2Corinthians 1:4

The Son of Man himself learned the one thing that the omniscient God could not know: "Son, though he was, he learned obedience from what he suffered ..." (Heb. 5:8). You have met him in that same scarring school and he joined you as you struggled Job-like with all your aching whys. This wasting season has not been wasted on you, dear friends. You have been sculpted by the chisel of longsuffering into comforters.

In the seasons ahead you will surely not be like Job's wearisome and foolish comforters. You will, in fact, be a better teacher in your school than you once were. With your faith of higher carat gold than before, you will enrich the students you teach and the staff you work with by your more Christ-like presence and patience, by your wisdom, grace, and trust, maybe even by your words. You have taken up your cross and thus are sculpted more closely to the likeness of Christ. That is why at this season I'm so thankful and honored to be numbered with you among the followers of Christ.

How do we show the love and mercy of Christ to those who have participated in an abortion decision?

Despite what Scripture says about taking a life, women faced with a crisis pregnancy are often convinced that abortion is the right choice or the only choice. With this conclusion, no wonder so many abortions occur. Nearly 3,000 abortions occur daily in the United States. That's equivalent to the deaths from the attack on 9/11, recurring every day in America. As a person, family, and country, we have gone astray like sheep. When our Shepherd calls out to us, "Come follow me," do we know His voice? Do we recognize the love and mercy of Christ when He says, "Your sins are forgiven, go and sin no more"?

As sinners, it only takes one suggestion to reinforce our sinful nature. Suddenly, we are convinced our reason for abortion is acceptable, perhaps even more so because it is legal. The truth is we make many sinful decisions, and we often follow the wrong voice instead of turning to the Word of God. St. Paul reminds us in Romans 6:1-2:

What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? Certainly not! How shall we who died to sin live any longer in it?

One sin covered up is often replaced by two or more sins. God tells us that where there is light and truth, darkness has no place. At Word of Hope, we share God's truth with guilt-ridden people to reveal the darkness of sin and shine light on the freedom from guilt in Christ's forgiveness. Through the blood of the Lamb, Jesus, there is forgiveness, grace, and mercy. This gift from God in Christ is at the heart of our approach to abortion recovery at Word of Hope.

Word of Hope (WOH), a ministry of Lutherans For Life, is a national hotline that offers confidential services 24/7 by phone, text, email, and video. We provide prevention, intervention, and healing resources for life issues like abortion by proclaiming the value of all life as divinely created and redeemed by Christ. At WOH, we acknowledge that forgiveness from sinful decisions and reconciliation with God through Christ is the Christian's cyclical path of sanctification. Our abortion recovery method leads individuals through the journey of recognizing their pain because of sin to living with a revived hope in Christ's promises.

At WOH we walk with each person through the six steps of abortion recovery. 1) Recognize the source of their pain, the suffering related to sin, and the need for a Savior. 2) Respect how every person is a sinner and vulnerable to follow a secular worldview instead of God's value for life. 3) Relate the grief to the greater tragedy of death by abortion. 4) Release of guilt and grief by trusting in Jesus for forgiveness from sins. 5) Redemption in Christ that reconciles the forgiven sinner with God. 6) Rehabilitate the individual through the healing process to be a Gospel-motivated voice For Life in the church and community.


Anguish and guilt often replace the relief sought through an abortion. When someone struggles with the overwhelming guilt of a past sin, like abortion, repentance and reconciliation are the only source of relief. There is hope! "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). Through all our days, the Lord never leaves us nor forsakes us. He is a patient God, waiting and wanting all to come to repentance and be saved.



So how does Word of Hope show the love and mercy of Christ to those who have gone astray by participating in an abortion decision? We seek to reach the lost and injured sheep. Healing begins by sharing God's Word so His voice of love, mercy, and forgiveness is made known. The journey continues by connecting individuals with a local congregation where Word and Sacrament regularly affirm the hope in Christ's promises. OPPORTUNITY TO DIGITIZE CHURCH RECORDS

With the Iowa District East Convention scheduled to take place on 24-25 June, 2022, congregations that have not yet had their Church Records (baptisms, confirmations, marriages, deaths) digitized have an offer by the IDE Archivist to photograph those records during the time of the Convention. Your pastor or convention delegate need only to bring the record books to the convention and hand them over to the archivist. They will then be photographed and held secure until the end of the convention. Then your representative can pick them up and take them home again.

Why bother? After all, they are safe and secure right where they are now. Safe and secure until some disaster strikes. In the past year, with some of those severe tornados tearing across the country, "secure" documents were later discovered many miles away from their "secure & safe" location. To have them digitized and a compact disk stored at the IDE Archives, you can be assured that if your congregation should happen to lose those records, there is a copy available at another location. And a bonus. Instead of hauling out the "big book" to find information for inquiring researchers, the congregation will have its own compact disk for easy access to information.

To help your archivist know whether he should plan to set up the photographing equipment at the convention, get the approval of your congregation to have the records digitized and then let me know that those records will be showing up at the Convention.

If your family is new to Camp Io-Dis-E-Ca, Family's First Camper is a scholarship program that brings down the cost of campers coming from families who have never sent children to Camp Io-Dis-E-Ca, so be sure to claim that if applicable! Additional financial aid is available for those needing assistance, but be sure to have the camp scholarship application in by May 22, 2022.

With regards to COVID-19, safety guidelines, health standards, and expectations from guests are constantly changing and evolving. A more detailed health plan will be released closer to summer. Over the past two summers, basic mitigation tactics implemented across our program have allowed us to operate free from COVID-19. Our hope is that Camp will feel as normal as possible for our campers so that they don't notice the behind-the-scenes changes that help mitigate COVID-19. At this point, we are unsure of the impact COVID-19 may have on our program. We currently plan to continue the same basic mitigation tactics implemented last summer, but we will of course consider state and local heath guidelines as summer approaches, so be on the lookout for more information as we get closer to summer!

Several years ago at a congregational revitalization event I was leading, I had the opportunity to listen to a member of the host congregation who was reminiscing about the good old days of the congregation. This is why/how we can rejoice in what God has done for us and in

It's *Still* All About Jesus

n my travels and work with congregations and districts throughout our Synod I have the great privilege to bring support and resources to rural and small-town congregations. In doing this, I am always amazed at the fortitude of so many of these congregations. They have seen wars, internal struggle and external strife; they have lived through good times and bad. Yet, through it all, multitudes have found respite in the comfort of Christ's Gospel proclaimed and delivered in these places.

Yet, too often in today's climate, they have slipped into a feeling of hopelessness, a general sense that they have little to offer the church and the world. What is forgotten here is that it isn't about any particular place or time. In fact, it's still all about Jesus! That is what got them this far in the first place, and it will be the hope that sustains them. In fact, it's the hope we are privileged to share with a hopeless world.

Throughout the world, even in our own back yard, there will always be persecution, bloodshed, hatred, malice and evil. Yet, it is our call to continue in the hope of the Lord and to proclaim His loving-kindness to all people. This is why I said in a blog post a couple of years ago, "From LWML to men's clubs, Sunday schools to VBS, youth groups to older adult ministries, these congregations are uniquely





situated to provide hope and healing to areas often forgotten and often ignored. Hardships and roadblocks can make these ministries a challenge to remain viable, but there are many who are addressing this challenge head on. They are creatively maintaining their mission presence so that the lost might hear about Jesus."

So, in an effort to continue mission and ministry, have you ever considered these questions?

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Lutherans For Life 2022 State of Iowa Essay Contest

Sponsored by the Council of Federation Presidents

For Students in Grades 6 through 12

Any Lutheran student in a Lutheran school or church is eligible. Lutheran students may also enter through a home school or congregation, e.g. confirmation class or youth group, when validated by a pastor or teacher.

Contest Guidelines

Students will write a life-affirming essay based on the theme: **Blessed For Life** with the Bible verse: "... the Lord protects him and keeps him alive; he is called blessed in the land; you do not give him up to the will of his enemies." Psalm 41:2. (Consider being blessed with the gift of life, blessed by God for one's entire life or blessed to be a blessing to others.)

- 1. Not incorporating the theme and verse in the essay will disqualify the entry.
- 2. Examples of topics the essay could deal with are, but are not limited to abortion, the handicapped, adoption or foster care, infanticide, cloning, stem cell research, physician assisted suicide or euthanasia etc.
- 3. Essays should include student's name, grade (school or church), and email address. All entries submitted by a teacher or pastor, should include their name and email address. This information should be submitted on the rubric page used in grading the essay.
- 4. All sources for references, statistics and quotes should be incorporated within the essay and then included in a bibliography at the end.

Grades 6 - 8 should submit essays up to 400 words

Grades 9 - 12 should submit essays up to 750 words

Entries should be submitted digitally using Microsoft Word or Google Docs to LFLoflowa@gmail.com by April 1, 2022.

- 5. There will be a \$100 first place award and \$50 second place award for each of the two categories. The two first place category winners will advance to the national contest. Email LFLoflowa@gmail.com with any questions.
- 6. Grand prize for the national winning entry at each level: \$250 plus free conference registration to the 2022 Lutherans For Life National conference and one night stay at the conference hotel.
