Connected To Power

April 24

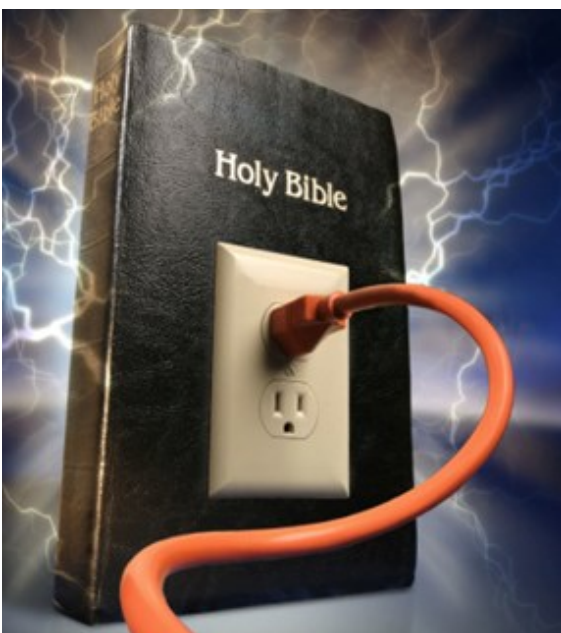
¹³ *When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth, for he will not speak on his own authority, but whatever he hears he will speak, and he will declare to you the things that are to come.* - John 16:13

On August 10, 2020, with very little time to prepare a storm called a derecho hit eastern Iowa bringing wind speeds of 140+ mph and causing widespread devastation. This unprecedented straight-line wind storm damaged hundreds of square miles and impacted every resident in its path in some way. Homes and businesses, farms, crops, and buildings, including several of our Lutheran schools in IDE were devastated. Thousands of people were without power for a week or more. The storm severely limited communication, as damage to local towers and above-ground cable lines caused widespread outages of cellular and internet services. There were many broken connections.

In the verses preceding the passage above we find Jesus meeting with His disciples in the Upper Room on the very night when He is betrayed. He's telling His them that they are going to experience a loss of power. On their own they were going to be powerless and disconnected, unable to deal with the what would lie ahead, the deep issues of life. However, the disciples heard that night that Jesus was not their only source of strength and power at the moment. He assured them that He would be connected to Him for life forever. Though He would physically depart from them on this earth, He will send the Holy Spirit.

A story I read recently happened some years ago when engineers building a new bridge over the East River in New York, discovered a wrecked hull of a ship, sunken many years before, lying right where the center piers were supposed to be built. Powerful machinery was brought in to remove the ship, but the ship wouldn't budge.??

Then, one of the engineers had an unusual idea - why not have the tide raise the ship. Some strong cables were attached to the hull of the sunken ship when the tide was low. The other ends were fastened to a barge floating above. As the tide came in, the barge gradually lifted the sunken ship powerfully out of its sandy grave. It was then towed out into the ocean and sunk at a spot that would not cause future problems.



Think about that's how the Holy Spirit works. He doesn't come to us today in a mighty wind, tongues of fire, and the ability to speak in many languages (Acts 2). He lifts us up from unbelief to faith or from weak faith to a strong faith. He comes to make the connection with the things that Jesus did which made possible the impossible. The power of the Holy Spirit isn't found in mighty engines or other human sources of power. The power of the Holy Spirit is divine. It connects us to the power source of Baptism and God's Word. When we partake of the Lord's Supper the Holy Spirit is there reminding us that Jesus Christ is truly present in this holy meal assuring us that He loves us and forgiving our repentant hearts.

Pentecost (May 19) is a reminder that we are connected to Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit. Some of you may remember teaching your students and cheerleaders the "spirit" cheer.

Either the opposing team's cheerleaders (or ours) would start "We've got spirit, yes we do! We've got spirit, how 'bout you?" Then the opposing side would respond with the same chant, and it would go back forth each time getting hopefully louder and louder. No, we weren't cheering about having the Holy Spirit, but what if you did that cheer in our classrooms or at chapel! Think about it! What would be the amazing result?!?!? (If any teacher or principal or EC Director does this, let me know how it went!)

But what about you. Do you have the Spirit? Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 12..."no one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit." So, if in your heart and your voice and your actions when you declare that "Jesus is Lord" yes, you indeed have the Holy Spirit. That saving faith is the greatest gift anyone could ever hope for or receive.

The 2023-2024 school year is coming to a close. I know. The month of May might seem like 90 days long BUT....there is still time for you to connect with each of your students in your own personal way by telling them about the Holy Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit and what He does for them and what He has done for you! Yes, there were times this year when sins got in the way because the "unholy trinity" (Satan, the world, and our sinful self) got in the way. But thanks be to God the broken connection has been fixed. The power of the Holy Spirit is always "on"! Your students have been blessed to you their Spirit-filled teacher being led by the Holy Spirit to bring the glorious news of Jesus. Thank you for what you have done to bless

Parish Nurse - Being Physically Active Can Make Up For Sitting

April 24

We've all heard about the health consequences of sitting for long periods of time such as:

- Weakening your leg and gluteal muscles.
- Causing your hip flexor muscles to shorten, leading to hip problems.
- Increasing your risk of developing type 2 diabetes.
- Escalating your risk of suffering a heart attack and stroke.

The good news is that a little exercise can offset the damages of prolonged sitting. A study published in the British Journal of Sports Medicine showed that just 20-25 minutes a day of physical activity helped to offset a sedentary lifestyle.

The study involved 12,000 people (aged 50+ years) who wore movement detection sensors for at least two years. The researchers found that those who sat for more than 12 hours a day had a 38% higher risk for an early death than those who sat for eight hours — but only if they also had less than the recommended 20-25 minutes a day of exercise. The more active a participant was, the more the risk declined.

The study was observational, so the data could not show cause and effect, but researchers concluded that even small amounts of physical activity may be an effective strategy to lessen the mortality risk due to being sedentary.

Life Coordinator - A Statement on the Alabama Supreme Court In Vitro Decision

April 24

...In 2018, with 59% of the vote, the people of Alabama adopted the Sanctity of Life Amendment...Protecting unborn human persons, the amendment makes no exceptions for children conceived in vitro. Children conceived in vitro therefore are “unborn children” and are entitled to “the rights of unborn children, including the right to life.”

...The case arose out of a lawsuit alleging that an Alabama clinic negligently allowed the destruction of frozen embryos. Ruling that these frozen embryos were unborn children under the Alabama Constitution, the Alabama Supreme Court sent the case back to the trial court for further adjudication. Fearing that they could be held liable for discarded frozen embryos, the University of Alabama at Birmingham Hospital suspended its in vitro program, and several other hospitals followed suit...

Lutherans For Life has adopted a [position statement](#) on in vitro fertilization which “recognizes the pain of childlessness and that some people, desiring to have children, have used in vitro fertilization without realizing or considering the potential consequences for the embryos involved,” but also recognizes that in vitro fertilization often results in the destruction of unused embryos. The position statement therefore concludes that “Lutherans For Life at the present time objects to and opposes the use of in vitro fertilization” but “does not condemn those married couples who have used in vitro fertilization but encourages ministry to them and to all people such that they may receive the comfort of Christ and His redeeming love.”

Consistent with our position statement, Lutherans For Life applauds the Alabama Supreme Court’s decision and hopes that continued research will develop ways in which those who are unable to conceive children will be able to have families without risking the loss of unborn human life.

In response to Overture 1.01 of the 2018 Iowa District East—LCMS District Convention, a district task force has been commissioned to, within the Iowa District East, to aid efforts to recruit and retain church workers in the LCMS. The synod has also launched Set Apart to Serve, an initiative of the LCMS to recruit church workers. This IDE Task force met in May, September, and November of 2022 and has developed the following vision statement:

We pray for God, through the intentional efforts of faithful mentors and ministries, to raise up and sustain well-qualified Lutheran church workers who are full of the love of God and are supported in their physical, emotional, financial, and spiritual well-being so that they may joyfully serve Christ and His church in their lifelong professional and personal vocations.

In addition, three initial goals were established: 1) Congregations, schools, ministries, families, and individuals regularly pray the Lord would send workers into the harvest; 2) All church workers view themselves as mentors; and 3) Cultivate a culture of well-supported workers. Achieving these goals will happen over time, but beginning with the Professional Packet, we hope to provide resources aimed recruiting and retaining church workers, beginning with providing prayers to be included for use in Divine service, school assemblies, classrooms, staff meetings, or at home.

This month's prayers for worship, school, and home:

*Heavenly Father, we thank you that for us your Son was baptized, for us He fasted and prayed, and for us He remained on the tree until the price was paid and our salvation finished. That we may obtain and endure in this faith, continue to provide your church with men who preach the whole counsel of God and administer your sacraments according to Christ's institution. Lord, in your mercy, **hear our prayer.***

*For church workers in all the nations, that Christ would be extolled and His grace given to all who are penitent, let us pray to the Lord, **Lord, have mercy.***

Approximately seventy-five Sunday-school teachers and pastors attended a Sunday-school teachers' institute held in Iowa Falls on Sunday, Nov. 14, at 2:30 P.M. The three members of the committee appointed by the Eldora Circuit Pastoral Conference arranged and conducted a very interesting program. Pastor E. Grummer of Latimer opened the institute with a short devotion and then enlarged upon the grave responsibilities confronting those who should teach "God's little ones" the way of salvation. The major part of the meeting was spent in discussing a practical demonstration of a method of preparing a Sunday-school lesson. Pastor J. Schliepsiek of Hubbard enumerated the following steps in a well-prepared lesson: 1. Prayer. 2. Read lesson in leaflet. 3. Read lesson in Bible. 4. Study context and cross-references in Bible. 5. Consult Bible dictionary and commentary. 6. Study nature of class to be instructed. 7. Trace central thought in lesson. 8. Develop application, including use of Bible-text and hymn verse. 9. Gather and restudy material, writing out the lesson if necessary. After each step was explained in a few well-chosen words, Pastor N. Ellermann of Iowa Falls would give the practical demonstration, and the point would be discussed by the teachers. Pastor E. Krieger of Grant Center closed the institute with a short inspirational address, in which he exhorted the teachers to continued faithfulness and zeal in their important work. In a short business meeting the teachers present elected Pastor Schliepsiek chairman of the Institute and Mr. E.G. Steinbach of Latimer secretary. It was unanimously decided to continue the institute. The officers together with the pastoral committee were asked to prepare the next program on "*Methods of Teaching a Bible Class*" and "*How to Derive applications from a Sunday-school Lesson.*" N.C.E.

Developing Empathy For Those Suffering From Addiction

In Harper Lee's classic novel, *To Kill A Mockingbird*, Atticus Finch continually tries to instill in his children, Scout and Jem, a sense of empathy by putting themselves in another's shoes. The concept of empathy is hard for them to grasp. For instance, the children view mean Mrs. Dubose as an abusive old woman who yells at them every time they walk by her house, but Atticus reveals to them that Mrs. Dubose is at heart a warrior, battling morphine addiction with every ounce of energy she possesses.

He wants them to see that this battle she fights is very difficult and so they should not judge her. At one point, Atticus explains to Scout, "If you can learn a simple trick, Scout, you'll get along a lot better with all kinds of folks. You never really understand a person until you consider things from his point of view . . . until you climb into his skin and walk around in it."

Wearing Our Neighbor's Shoes

Wearing someone else's shoes, walking around in their skin, even borrowing a different lens are all metaphors for the same thing: learning to view circumstances or events from a new perspective. One of the ways in which we can view circumstances or events in a new way is by developing empathy. We can discuss this best by reviewing Christ's parable of the good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37). In response

to the lawyer's question, "Who is my neighbor?" Christ told the parable of the good Samaritan. A man was robbed, stripped naked, beaten, and left for dead on the road to Jericho. Both a priest and a Levite saw the man and walked by on the other side of the road. Finally, a Samaritan stops and helps, going out of his way to save the man's life.

What is the difference between the three men: the priest, the Levite, and the Samaritan? They were all men of seemingly good moral codes. Why did the first two men fail to act? One can speculate that they saw the need of the man and perhaps they thought, when I am done with what I need to accomplish today, when I check off all the boxes of my "to-do" list, then I will come back. Perhaps they thought that their job was to keep holy and pure and not contaminate themselves with a task that might seem "unclean" because of their duties as a priest and a worker in the temple. Perhaps they patted themselves on the back that they had kept themselves untangled from an unsavory experience. We will never know their thoughts or intentions, only their roles and their actions.

The Compassion of the Good Samaritan

We don't know the occupation of the Samaritan, but we do know that Samaritans were despised by the Jews. For his entire life, the Samaritan man may have grown up knowing that others considered him inferior. Christ emphasizes that the Samaritan was motivated by "compassion" (Luke 10:33). Perhaps the Samaritan had learned compassion through his own experience of being mistreated. He must have known something of what that man half-dead on the side of the road was feeling. While the priest and the Levite focused on something, anything else, the Samaritan looked with lenses refined by his own painful experiences. We call such regard for another's feelings empathy.

Empathy and Counseling

Empathy has been a key factor in my own professional journey as a marriage and family therapist intern. Within the context of empathy, my experiences as a human being have made me a better counselor. I feel empathy for those suffering from mental illness, the death of a loved one, enslaving addictions and other painful losses, because I myself have experienced these things. While I can't share one's pain, I can understand and help. I would like to share four ways in which we can enhance our ability to feel and convey empathy, especially when, like Atticus, Scout, and Jem we see someone in our midst who is fighting addiction.

In counseling, I try to be like Atticus Finch. One cannot adequately help a client unless one has a good understanding of how that client feels. We practice by identifying feelings, asking if our sense of their emotion is correct, and listening to the underlying reason for that feeling. There is nothing quite like being understood by another person. Feeling understood is the first step in establishing a relationship of trust. If one focuses prematurely on identifying and solving a client's problem without first understanding who the client is and what they are feeling, we are bound to fail. Clients, even those with profound addiction problems, have a remarkable ability to find the motivation to solve their own problems once they feel truly understood.

Seeing More Clearly through the Lens of Empathy

One of the most empathetic people to live in our lifetime is Mother Teresa, a Catholic nun who worked with impoverished Indian orphans. She has said, "Being unwanted, unloved, uncared for, forgotten by everybody, I think that is a much greater hunger, a much greater poverty than the person who has

nothing to eat.” People are hungry for compassion, for understanding, for caring. There is much more to professional therapy than expressing empathy. But without empathy, you won’t get very far as a therapist. So as therapists, we borrow our client’s lenses to see their struggles. Then we lend them our lens to see beyond the dead-end or pit they see themselves in. Our lens is the lens of hope and resolution.

Once we see clearly where someone is, empathy is developed further by reaching out to help another. This is exemplified by the Samaritan. He didn’t simply sit next to the beaten man and say, “I too know what it is like to feel broken.” He did something about the other person’s brokenness. And who among us are the broken and beaten that we walk by?

Developing Empathy for those Suffering with Addiction

For many, it is those who suffer silently with addiction, either their own or that of a loved one. Through empathy we will know exactly what the other person needs, especially those who struggle with addiction: a friend to call when the temptation to use grows to be too much, someone to attend an AA meeting with, or a pastor to confess to. It might be simply a smile or kind word. Or, it might be information about needed resources. Other times, it might involve boundaries to not enable addictive behaviors.

Lastly, when we struggle with knowing how best to help, empathy is enhanced through a prayer to understand another’s feelings and how best to help. God knows all that is happening with the person we are seeking to help. We can ask Him to help us hear that person’s heart and guide our work together.

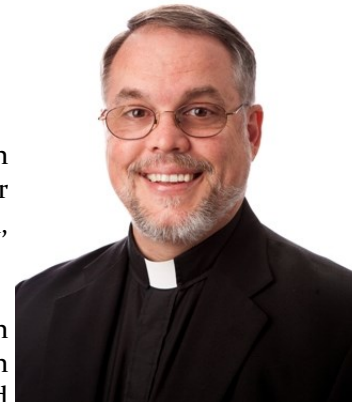

He is an adjunct member of the faculty of Concordia Theological Seminary, having taught Old Testament Bible in 2003 and 2004, and Biblical Greek online for the last 16 years. He has taught as a visiting professor at Concordia University Ann Arbor, and served for many years as an adjunct member of the faculty at Washtenaw Community College in Ypsilanti, Michigan.

Fr. Braden serves as the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Concordia University System. He also serves on the Board of Gottesdienst, and is a Departmental Editor, having authored the Taking Pains column in every issue since 2009. He periodically participates in Gottesdienst regional conferences, podcasts and blog posts. He serves as host and a frequent presenter at the annual St. Michael Liturgical Conference, held at Zion Detroit each year in September. His interests lie in the conduct of the Divine Service, and the historical development of the ceremony, the rite, and the rubrics of the Western Mass.

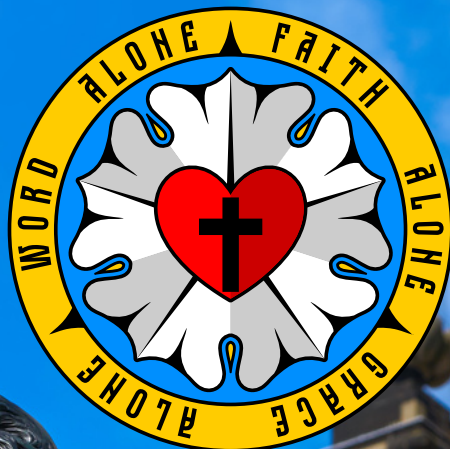
