President's Piece for Peace

At the risk of sounding like a Boy Scout I ask this question: "Are you and your congregation or school prepared?" Often this question is focused on preparation for eternal life. I do not make little of that preparation. It is the very reason we are baptized into the Christian Church. It is also the reason we remain in the Christian Church which feeds us God's Word and His Holy Sacraments. The promise of eternal life with Christ in heaven is the greatest comfort to the weary soul.

That being said, I ask the question of preparedness on another level. It is a question concerning our necessity to ready to respond, or even react, to crisis situations. Sadly, more and more, we hear of the tragedy when danger and harm infect the assembly of God's people by those full of hatred and anger. Summertime is a good time to make sure policies are reviewed and clarified if need be. It is a good time to instruct, train, and prepare for that which we pray never needs to be implemented. Congregations and schools are the populace of those Jesus has redeemed and re-created in His image with the Word of God and the Sacraments. All souls are precious to our Lord and deserve the best planning and preparedness possible should Satan raise his ire against the Lord's anointed in unimaginable ways.

(Summertime) is a good time to instruct, train, and prepare for that which we pray never needs to be implemented.

To be prepared may be a Boy Scout motto, but it is also good advice for the Church as we rejoice over the certainty of salvation earned and gifted to us by Christ Jesus. It is also a good practice for us as we live our lives in a world full of sin and destruction. May God grant us safety and peace by His good and gracious will as we fearlessly and boldly gather in His Church and schools.

The title of this article is an oxymoron. Yes, I shall refresh your memory of the definition of an oxymoron. First, what it is not. It is not another name for a person who cuts in front of you on I-380 nearly causing an accident. Truthfully, an oxymoron is a figure of speech containing words which seem to contradict each other. Here are some others:

jumbo shrimp military intelligence numb feeling fresh frozen working vacation negative growth unbiased opinion oddly appropriate deafening silence random order



You are, no doubt, familiar with the Lutheran oxymoron *Simul Justus et Peccator*. For those of us who didn't take Latin this is Martin Luther's phrase for saying that in our justification we are one and the same time righteous or just, and sinners. In short, we often abbreviate this as the "sinner/saint" relationship. The good news is that we are justified by God, not based on what we did, but because of what Christ has accomplished for us by His death and resurrection.

You've had many little or big oxymorons under your care this past school year. As you look forward to this coming school year 2024-2025, you will be blessed with another batch of

them. These sinner/saints of various sizes came to you in 2023-2024, or will be arriving in your classroom this coming August with a need for a Doctor. That Doctor, of course is Jesus. That's because their lives are sick with sin, and to make them well, Jesus the great Physician needs to enter and make a home in their heart and life. Yes, it's sad that despite Jesus' sacrifice on the cross and His great medicine found in His Word, the world is still filled with sorry, sick, and sinful souls.

It's both hard and it's rewarding what we do as His worker in the Kingdom. How can we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus while what we do day in and day out? One thing we can do is to open our Bibles and read what Jesus did with a certain disciple. The one I'm thinking about is Matthew, the tax collector. Tax collectors had a terrible reputation. A tax collector made an agreement with the occupying Roman government to collect a pre-determined amount of money. The Romans didn't especially care how they got their money so the tax collectors could be creatively harsh in the collection process. Thus, they were hated and considered to be traitors, conspirators, and a sell-out. Men like Matthew had no social standing, and their money could not be accepted by the local synagogue.

We wonder how or why Jesus considered a sinful tax collector like Matthew made it as one of Jesus' disciples? Well, that's because the Doctor saw beyond the his sickness and invited him Matthew to "Follow me". Jesus has a special place in His heart for those people who are society's sinners. He came to seek and save the lost. He has what is needed, namely the ability to see Matthew as His beloved child and forgive sins. The Doctor didn't come to seek and save people who are well. If there were any, there would be no reason for

He wants us to know that no matter how much of a sinner we are or how bad our life is, Jesus still comes and says, "follow me". The sinner/saint relationship is complete, not because of what Jesus did for him.

Turn the pages of your Bible a few more pages and you'll soon come across another oxymoronic individual. That would be the person who considered himself the "chief of sinners" (see 1 Timothy 1:15) found in the book of Acts. That's what Paul called himself after his conversion. Before his conversion, in Acts 9:1 we read these words, *"Meanwhile, Saul was still breathing out murderous threats against the Lord's disciples."* It was while he was on the road to Damascus to bring men and women to Jerusalem as prisoners who belonged to the Way that a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and thus began the conversation with Jesus and later conversion by the Holy Spirit. This man, Paul, was chosen by God to be His chosen instrument. *Simul Justus et Peccator*. He, too, experienced the sinner/saint relationship.

What about David? Moses? Adam and Eve? Abraham? Isaiah? Elijah? Mary and Martha? Simeon? The other disciples? Scripture is filled with men and women who are oxymoronic – if there is such a word. Sinners and saints who God loved, forgave, and now takes up residence in our hearts.. You and I are counted to be among the living sinner/saints right now. We have been privileged to be able to share Jesus with our students from the past and our students in the future. Some of them know Jesus. Some might know a little bit. Some of them have never heard about him. No matter which students are placed in your care, you and your sinner/saint colleagues march forth into a new adventure where every day you will have the privilege and responsibility to share this Good News with them.

May your summer days be blessed by the might hand of God as you relax, rest, and rejuvenate. Stay connected to Him through your personal devotion time, worship, and fellowship with fellow sinner/saints! Commence praying for the new class of students you will have. Don't let Satan get in the way of beginning of this new relationship with them by which the Doctor has already arranged for you to be together.

Dear saints in Christ Jesus:

Blessed Fathers' Day to all you fathers! Below is a selection from a book entitled, "For Better, Not for Worse: A Manual of Christian Matrimony," written by Walter A. Maier, the first speaker of the Lutheran Hour. This book was first published in 1935 and yet is still very timely today in its critique of culture and its bold endorsement of the living and eternal Word of God. We give thanks to God for our fathers, through whom God teaches us to fear, love, and trust in God above all things!

(From Part Four, Criteria of Happy Choice: Pivotal Parents)

"We must remember that, according to divine social standards, fathers, not mothers alone, are given the command to bring up their children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" (Ephesians 6:4). It is a false philosophy of home-life which develops this argument: "I earn the money for food and clothing and shelter, and my wife must do the rest. I look after the family interests outside of the home, while she directs its welfare within the home." Even the complexities of our modern life cannot bring exemption from the sacred responsibility of supervising the education, spiritual care, and moral growth of those in his household. Above the Chief Parts of the Catechism Luther placed the admonition that "A father should teach them diligently to his household." The great Reformer insisted: "No one should become a father unless he is able to instruct his children in the Ten Commandments and in the Gospel, so that he may bring up true Christians." Fathers knowing that they are ordained by God to be the heads of their families must first find time to meet the demands of their exalted position. If they are preoccupied with business or social obligations, some of these should be dropped."

"Parental authority must be firm, though not tyrannical. Modern trends in child-training protest vigorously. A popular writer on questions of the home, for example, believes that the home is often "an autocracy, instead of a democracy," and he rejoices that "heavy father stuff" is a thing of the past. But jurists who preside over juvenile courts, as well as social workers and pastors, who meet humanity at its worst, of course, tell us that the collapse of parental authority is one of the major factors in the staggering rise of youthful delinguency."

"Fathers must give a stimulating example to their children, particularly in meeting their spiritual duties; for the word of paternal counsel will fail when contradicted by the life of the counselor. Every man should try to measure the personal importance of the Scriptural appeal: "Fathers, provoke not your children to anger lest they be discouraged" (Colossians 3:21)."

6. Prayers in the evening will invoke the angels' watchfulness over us and ours, affording light in the darkness and protection in our weakness.

7. The family altar will strengthen us to withstand bravely the adversities of life, for it helps to found our homes on that Rock against which all trials and tempests will beat in vain.

8. Family prayers will exert a blessed influence on friends who visit our homes or on guests who are sheltered within our walls.

9. Prayerful homes will help to reinforce that righteousness which "exalteth a nation."

10. The family altar will mightily strengthen the work and the influence of the Church and its agencies throughout the world.

11. Prayerful homes will honor our heavenly Father and, in turn, be honored by Him.

12. Families that are fervent in the faith have a foretaste of the heavenly homeland even on earth and enjoy the assurance that in the prepared mansions they will be a part of the "whole family in heaven.""

Parish Nurse - Sugar Negates Heart-Healthy Exercise

A recent study indicates that drinking just two servings per week of sugar-sweetened beverages such as soda or sports drinks can erase the heart health benefits of physical activity. The findings, published in *The American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*, were based on an analysis of data involving 100,000 adults over a 30-year period.

The results showed that people who drank sugar-sweetened beverages more than twice a week had an increased risk of cardiovascular disease despite their engagement of 150 minutes of weekly physical activity (the recommended amount of weekly workout time). For those who consumed sweetened beverages on a daily basis, the risk for cardiovascular disease was even higher.

The reason is that ultra-processed sugary drinks promote chronic inflammation which puts stress on the heart and blood vessels which can lead to increased buildup of plaque in the major arteries of the body. Most public health organizations recommend completely replacing soda – even diet soda – with water and unprocessed fruit, but if you feel the need for a soda, try to limit your consumption to 1 can of soda per week.

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IDE ARCHIVES Pastor & teacher conferences

Northern Pastoral Conference May 2, 1939 – Vol. 58, No. 9

The Northern Pastoral Conference, comprising the Dubuque, Eldora, and Waterloo circuits of the Iowa district East, met for its regular spring conference on April 11 and 12 in Waterloo (W.D. Oetting, pastor). Despite frigid temperatures and wintery blasts every member of the group was in attendance. In addition, there were present as guests Mission Secretary Hinck, Pastors Deletzke, Krueger, and Starke, Jr., of the Southern Pastoral conference....The forenoon sessions and also a goodly portion of the afternoon sessions were devoted to the discussion of doctrinal papers. Pastor Theo. Frese submitted a paper on *Rom. 12:3ff.*; Pastor Brewer presented a similar study on *Matt. 7:15ff.* Much time was given to the study and discussion of church union, led by Pastor Grummer on the basis of a pamphlet entitled *Unity, Union, and Unionism*, prepared by the Norwegian brethren. Synodical matters were ably presented by President C. Hesse. Round-table discussions of practical questions rounded out a well-filled program....The next meeting will be held, D.v., on Oct. 24 and 25 in Readlyn, the Rev. Theo. Frese, pastor.

Northern Pastoral Conference November 14, 1939 – Vol. 58, No. 23

"Why does our pastor go to conferences? Is that necessary? What does he do there?" These are questions that may well arise in the minds of many when they hear their minister announce that he will be gone for several days, attending a conference with his fellow-pastors. The following report gives the average picture of such a pastoral conference. This one met October 24 and 25 in St. Paul's Church, Readlyn, Iowa (Theo. Frese, pastor). It was the fall conference of those pastors whose congregations are situated in the northern half of our Iowa District East, the Dubuque, Waterloo, and Eldora circuits. Thirty-three pastors, candidates, and students were present. The first session began promptly at 9 A.M. Some brethren had over 100 miles to drive, but just about every member was there on time. Pastor Schreiber of Delaware, chairman of the conference, conducted the opening devotion. The secretary, Pastor Otto Koch of Reinbeck, read the minutes of the previous conference. Two doctrinal treatises engaged the attention of the group during the morning session. The first was an exegetical paper on Rom. 12 by Pastor Theo. Freses; the second paper treated The Doctrine of the Holy Trinity in the Old Testament and was presented by Pastor Oetting of Waterloo. He showed how the Old Testament Scriptures clearly speak of the three distinct Persons in the Godhead, even as the New Testament does. There was a very thorough discussion of the exact meaning of the words of Scripture by the assembly. The good ladies of St. Paul's served a sumptuous dinner, after which the conference again sat in session. President Hesse spoke to the pastors on the affairs of Synod and of the District. Referring to the present conditions in the world, he encouraged every pastor to do his duty in presenting the needs of the Church and of our Synod to his people, urging them that out of love to the Savior they work and pray and give for the work of the Lord as the Lord enables them to do. He affirmed that our people still have things to

give the Lord if they only will. He told how one of our consecrated laymen remarked: "Our people have no money for Synod because they need it all to build corn-cribs." President Hesse also requested that every congregation be urged to remit to the District Treasurer the cost of placing the Lutheran Witness into our homes. In the evening a Communion service was held, in which the pastors partook of the Lord's supper. The Rev. E.L. Runge of Spring Fountain delivered the confessional address on the basis of the words "Is it well with thee?" (2 Kings 4:26), pointing out that it is well also with the pastor only when he repents of his sin and trusts solely in the merits of Jesus, his Savior. The pastoral sermon was preached by the Rev. H.H. Kirchmann of McGregor on the basis of 1 Thess. 2:18. He showed very pointedly that in the last analysis it is Satan who hinders the pastor's work, working havoc and indifference among his people, and that the only weapon that will defeat him is the Word of god, which the pastor should therefore diligently apply. In the session Wednesday morning Pastor Frese continued his treatise on Rom. 12. This was followed by a paper on Divorce and Adultery According to the Scripture by the Rev. H.A. Bentrup of Elma. After the customary treat of a chicken dinner by the ladies Pastor Bentrup completed the reading of his essay. This was followed by a paper on The history of the differences between our Missouri Synod and other Lutheran synods, delivered by Vice-President P. Brammer of St. Ansgar. According to the custom, one of the pastors delivered a sermon for the sake of obtaining helpful criticism from his fellow-pastors. Late in the afternoon the conference adjourned with the singing of a hymn and with prayer, whereupon the pastors returned to their respective charges, strengthened by the Word of God and encouraged through contacts with their brethren, to feed the flock over which the Holy Ghost has made them overseers. -E.L. Stuempfig

Dubuque Circuit Teachers' Conference November 28, 1939 – Vol. 58, No. 24

On Friday, October 6, the parochial-school teachers of the Dubuque Circuit held their semiannual oneday conference at St Peter-Westgate, Iowa. The morning hours were spent in observing the work of the Westgate faculty, Teacher Suhr and Candidate Kersten. In the afternoon, time was allotted for a discussion and criticism of the forenoon's teaching demonstration. Perhaps the most interesting feature of the conference was a remarkable demonstration and a profitable explanation of the Stellhorn system of teaching children to sing. In the demonstration it was shown how an entire school of fifty-two children could, without any previous practice, sing a song in three-part harmony after being drilled according to the Stellhorn method. During the explanation of this system in the afternoon we were shown its remarkable simplicity. Not only were all eight teachers of the circuit in attendance, but four pastors also visited the conference. Among the new faces we found Students R. Ernst of Sumner, A.H. Drevelow of Delaware, and Candidate Kersten of Westgate. Two lady teachers, Miss Niemann of Spring Fountain and Miss Segebarth of Fredericksburg, plus the veterans of several years, Mr. Suhr of Westgate, Mr. Potratz of Fairmank, and Mr. Glandorf of Dubuque, were among the familiar faces present. All of us enjoyed the fine meals served by the Westgate ladies. —Rev. H.J. Wunderlich

Joint Pastors' & Teachers' Conference April 16, 1940 – Vol. 59, No. 8

St. Paul's Eldora, host Pastors and Teachers Annual Joint Conference on March 26-27. [extracts] The conference is composed of 83 pastors and 27 teachers. The sermon was delivered by the Rev. Virtus Gloe of Kansas City, city missionary and secretary of the Associated Lutheran Charities. In a very interesting manner, on the basis of *Luke 10:38-42*, Pastor Gloe stressed the importance of individual soul-counseling, as the Master counseled and instructed Mary in the home in Bethany. His message

carried a warning against letting congregations grow so large that this care of the individual souls cannot be attended to as it should. In the joint sessions Pastor Gloe delivered an interesting treatise on *Normal and Abnormal Human Behavior*, showing how a study and application of psychology will prove very helpful in the work in the congregation and in the school. The Rev. R.P. Young of Victor presented a thought-provoking study of *Jehovah's Witnesses*. Pastor M. Steege of Cedar Rapids delivered an exegetical treatise on *Rom. 8:18-23*. On Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning separate sessions were held by the pastors and by the teachers. In these sessions Pastor R. Torgler of Clinton gave valuable suggestions on conducting a *Gospel Preaching Mission*. Pastor Erich Krieger of Alden presented a study of the book of the *Prophet Obadiah*. Pastor C. Krog of Marion set forth the *Erroneous Teachings of Karl Barth*. The teachers received much help from a lecture delivered by Dr. W.H. Beck of our teachers' college in Seward, Nebr. Among the other lectures delivered before the body of teachers were *Biblical Visions* by Mr. F. Eggerding; *Commerce and Industry in the U.S.* by Mr. Mertz; and *The Red Menace* by Mr. E. Studt. Conference came to a close on Wednesday afternoon with a brief service conducted by Chaplain Bertram.

Northern Pastoral Conference June 11, 1940 – Vol. 59, No. 12

[Compare ambitious plan above with actual Report] About thirty pastors were able to attend the conference. In the first session on Tuesday morning, Rev. Th. Frese of Readlyn read an exegetical paper of *Rom. 12.* Pastor Kirchmann of McGregor presented a paper on *the Lutheran, the Arminian, the Catholic, and the Calvinistic doctrines of faith.* President C. Hesse of Eldora presented a number of synodical matters in the afternoon session. A report of the *Inter-synodical Conference* which met in Monticello was given by Rev. Wunderlich of Fredericksburg. The Rev. Th. Eickelberg read a paper dealing with the *Augsburg Confession.* The Wednesday morning session was devoted to the reading and discussion of two papers: *A Number of Christian Symbols* by Rev. Edm. Frese of Shell Rock and *Present Status of Church Discipline in the Various Lutheran Church-bodies* by Rev. E. Stuempfig. A paper which dealt with the Athanasian Creed was presented by Pastor Yohr of Osage. The nest conference will be held at Sumner on Oct. 29 and 30, God willing. –A. Kr.

The designation of any gift shall be limited to the definition of an eligible student by the Code of Iowa and the criteria established by the Board of the Iowa Lutheran School Tuition Organization. Designated funds will be used for the designated school up to 70% of need of eligible students as determined by the ILSTO funding formula. Any remaining funds will then be allocated to eligible students throughout the Iowa Lutheran STO schools.

IOWA LUTHERAN SCHOOL TUITION ORGANIZATION

A student tuition organization is lowa's answer to assisting students to attend the school of their choice – not necessarily their local public schools. Your local Lutheran school provides just such a choice for church and community members. Fourteen LCMS schools of lowa have come together to form this organization – a 501c(3) not-for-profit organization. Anyone who pays lowa state income tax can donate and receive the tax benefits.

Who is in charge of the Iowa Lutheran STO?

A seven-member Board of Directors sets policy for the organization and oversees the proper dollar allocations. The board has employed one program manager for the state of Iowa.

Who may receive the lowa tax benefit?

Anyone who is obligated to complete an lowa state income tax return may receive the tax credit. It is not limited to members of Lutheran congregations. Anyone can donate and receive the tax benefits. C Corporations, S Corporations, Iowa 1065 (partnerships), and LLC Corporations are eligible for 2024 donations. Credits are also available for estates or trusts, either on Iowa 1041 or when income is passed down to beneficiaries.

The benefits to the donor are:

• Seeing more children able to attend our Lutheran schools so that they may have Jesus in their lives every day.

 Knowing families may not be struggling quite so much because of increasing tuition rates and their commitment to sending their children to a participating Lutheran School.

• 75% tax credit on Iowa income tax. What does this really mean? It means that you could donate \$1000 and receive a \$750 reduction on your Iowa Income Taxes.

• Qualifies as a Charitable Deduction on your Federal Tax Return. Check with your tax preparer for exact percentage.

Ten Actions To Increase Christian Adoption



Lutheran Family Service, together with Lutherans For Life and Christian Life Resources, hosted the Lutheran Adoption Conference, April 10-11, in Houston, TX. Conference attendees were a mix of Lutheran faith leaders, lay leaders, pro-life organizations, adoption experts and more.

The conference mission? To increase the number of biblically-based, Christian adoptions so that more little boys and girls know the love of Jesus.

A biblical view of adoption means that we desire to bring children to a new life in Christ. It's a faith-giving act of love. Adoption today can often be self-serving with no regard for the child's salvation. As Christian adoption agencies decrease in number, an increasing number of adoptions are done with no intentions of bringing Christ's love to these children. Conference attendees and organizations are motivated now, more than ever, to do something about it!

What can you do?

Read for TEN actions you can take to build awareness and take action regarding biblically-based, Christian adoption!

The Lord be with you!

We received considerable positive response to the event (even while it was still happening!). Energy is building among Lutherans to engage in receiving God's blessings and serving our neighbors through fostering and adoption. Several are already wondering, "What steps come next? How can I help prepare and mobilize? Do you have anything I can do now?"

YES! Here are ten actions you can take at once to increase Lutheran involvement in adopting:

- Talk about it and tell somebody. Share what you learned and what you liked at the Lutheran Adoption Conference with a loved one in your family, congregation, workplace, or community. Invite them to view the <u>family testimonial videos</u> or <u>Mark</u> <u>Schultz's tribute to his birth mother</u>. Don't forget to post (and like or follow the conference sponsors) on social media! Visit their websites for social media links:

- 2. **Identify adoption experiences in your congregation.** Consider an announcement in the weekly bulletin or monthly newsletter encouraging adoptive families to contact you. Compile a directory with a paragraph or two about each one's story. Or plan a potluck to express appreciation and support for them as guests of honor.
- 3. **Locate relevant agencies.** Explore whether your locale or region has nonprofits (such as Lutheran family ministries or pregnancy resource centers) that facilitate adoption and explore where they operate. Investigate their convictions favoring placement in biblical families. Inquire of their leaders and your parish's leaders how you might connect the two entities and collaborate. Introduce yourself also to any congregation members with vocations in medicine, social service, and legislation.
- 4. **Learn more.** Research into adoption theology or adoption policy (even an online search for the phrases will get you started!). Peruse the websites of <u>Lutherans For Life</u>, <u>Lutheran Family Service</u>, <u>Christian Life Resources</u>, <u>The Riverside Project</u>, and the <u>Christian Adoptions Alliance</u>.
- 5. **Pray.** Remember those awaiting adoption before the Lord. Include them in the church's Sunday morning worship prayers as well. Ask Him to make you more aware

and willing with regard to opportunities for you to have a hand in caring for children who need homes and families.

- 6. **Donate.** Give an offering to one of the above organizations or another charity that assists the mission like <u>LifeSong for Orphans</u> or <u>Pathways for Little Feet</u>. Better yet, become a monthly or annual contributor. Even better still, present an offering directly to one of the adoptive families you know!
- 7. **Volunteer**. Make yourself available to the adoption agency or pregnancy resource center for whatever nonprofessional tasks they may have. Or offer to provide childcare, housekeeping, or errands for an adoptive family.
- 8. **Educate.** Promote a congregational Bible study or Sunday school lesson about the adoptions God undertakes in the narratives of Scripture. Host an ambassador from an area agency at the church for an informational meeting to overview opportunities and needs.
- Advocate. Reach out to your elected representatives both state-level and national

 to inform them of your endorsement for regulations that incentivize adopting. Look
 for what beneficial measures other places have enacted as well as any the current
 session is considering. Find out how you might encourage officials to introduce such
 proposals.
- 10. **Contemplate opening your home.** Ponder and dialogue together with your spouse and family about the Lord God's call to care. What blessings and what obstacles could emerge from your household's unique character? What details do you need to identify before deciding? What would it take for you to commence the process?

We don't have to leave the adventure and the delight to someone else or another time. Our Heavenly Father, through Jesus the Savior, has brought adoption and fostering to your attention for such a time as this!

Dr. Cameron MacKenzie is the Ellis Professor of Historical Theology at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne (CTSFW), Indiana, and chairman of the department. At CTSFW since 1983, he has a BA in mathematics and history from the University of Detroit, an MA in history from the University of Chicago, an MA in classics from Wayne State University, an STM in New Testament from CTSFW, and a PhD in history from the University of Notre Dame. Prior to coming to CTSFW, Dr. MacKenzie was pastor for eight years of St. Matthew

Lutheran Church in Detroit, Michigan, where he also served as headmaster of the parish school.

Luther's Theology in Today's World

Is Lutheran theology as Luther himself developed it still relevant today? In a postmodern world that challenges the very existence of truth, can Lutherans still make use of Luther? After reading some of Luther's most significant writings and recalling their context in Luther's life and career, students will explore the Reformer's insights that are still important and discuss ways in which Lutherans today can demonstrate their relevance to contemporary society.




