President's Piece for Peace

September 24

Everything is getting started back up for the blessed business of the Church. Schools are back in session. Sunday School has begun where there might have been a summer hiatus. Bible Classes are being scheduled during the week along with Confirmation Catechism instruction. I pray all is going smoothly with you as we transition from summer rest to fall full-go.

The more we interact, the more Gospel we have the privilege to teach and discuss. The more we teach and discuss the more Satan wants to interrupt this process and interfere with the work of the Church. His greatest tool of disruption is distrust of one another and negative opinions with those with whom we may differ. Did someone say something we may not like? Did someone's desires interfere or conflict with your own? Do we have concerns over fellow workers' performance, effort, attitude, etc.? If so, let not Satan get in the way! Here is how to prevent that. What I am going to write here may seem overly simple, and maybe it is. Yet, it is very effective in "getting Satan behind us." I will use a simple formula that makes use of the letter C.

Concerns: we have them. There is nothing wrong with having them. They may be valid, or they may not. There is only one way to find out if the concerns are warranted.

Clarify: we may not have heard correctly what we think we did. Ask the speaker to clarify what they said. You can even voice the concern you have, so you ask questions to make sure you heard correctly. Take the time to ask if they have given thought to how it sounded or might be taken by others.

Clarify: someone has written something in the bulletin or newsletter that may not articulate the point clearly. Again, take the time to ask the writer what point they are making. Suggest something easier to understand

for the sake of clarity and understanding. After all, if someone has something important to say or write, they need to be hearable and readable.

Conclusion: going from concern to conclusion without clarifying is where Satan makes the most of his effort to disrupt the work of the Church among her members. It is also a serious failure of Luther's explanation "to put the best construction on everything." Conclusions that are most fruitful for the Church come when complete clarity is comprehendThe Church does not jump from concern to conclusion without clarity.

ed of what was said or written. It only takes love for the speaker or writer along with the time and courtesy it takes to ask questions out of appreciation and respect.

The Church does not jump from concern to conclusion without clarity. It is the way of the Reformers who spent endless hours writing, asking questions, and pleading with Scripture for the sake of correcting errors. Luther did not jump from concern to conclusion. He took at least 13 years between the posting of the 95 theses until the Augsburg Confession. The Augsburg is an accurate conclusion to the doctrines Scripture reveals. Not everyone listened. But at least he demonstrated love for the Word, for those who have gone astray, and those who needed to hear what he had to say. He had something important to say. So, he was hearable and readable. We must do the same. God be with you all.

Can you figure out what all these items that have a check mark behind them have in common? Of course, you did. It's a checklist for a runner who is going out for a run in a 5K, 10K, marathon, or even a few trips around the block. A runner is going to need supportive running shoes, not flip-flops. To stay in shape a runner needs to take of him/herself by eating the proper foods and staying hydrated by drinking plenty of water. It also helps if the runner has some help with training.

Training isn't easy. It takes a lot of work. It takes a lot of endurance. I'm not a runner but I do know people who like to run. For example, Jill, the kindergarten teacher who donated her kidney to my husband Jerry is a runner. I know Jill gets up early in the morning and runs miles

before the rest of her family wakes up. She has carefully planned a schedule of running so she can prepare herself well to compete. (side bar: Jill's ability to run well did not get passed on to Jerry even though he has her kidney!) I know runners will go outside in all kinds of weather so it's necessary to have the right protection from the elements to protect their body. In our Bible passage, above, God is using the writer of the book of Hebrews to tell us that as Christians we have a race to run, too.

The passage from Scripture says, "Let us run with endurance the race that is set before us." (Heb. 12:1) For Christians, we are racing toward the heavenly goal of eternal life with Jesus. Every day, by faith, we get to honor Jesus by what think, say, and do. Because of what Jesus did for us by dying on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins, we want to tell Him and show Him how thankful we are.

Sometimes runners face struggles as they train for a race. It could be a sprained ankle, an illness, or even an angry dog. Christians struggle, too. For us, our struggle is against sin. Satan doesn't want us to finish the race. He'd rather see us spend eternal life with him in hell rather than us receiving the eternal prize of heaven. When we have problems, Satan is working hard on us to give up or quit. We fight temptations from him all day. It doesn't matter what our age is, who we are, or how long we've been a Christian. Satan is so good at knowing which buttons to push to tease and tempt us to do what's wrong. We just aren't strong enough to run this race without help. No one can do this alone.

Thankfully there is help. We believers have faith in Jesus given to us at our baptism. Jesus has another checklist that helps us look to Jesus, to grow in our faith, and to tell others about Him so that one day we will inherit the free gift of eternal life. Until Jesus comes back to take us to heaven He gives us equipment to help us run the race to eternal life. It looks something like this.

The Bible is the book of books that helps us endure the race and stay strong. The other items on the checklist help, too. By faith, when we look to Jesus He gives us the endurance to keep going. It's nothing we do on our own to earn eternal life. It's a free gift. Sometimes we fail to do what God wants us to do. When we do, He offers us forgiveness and the opportunity to help us keep from doing sins again and again. And, it helps us forgive others when we are mistreated or spoken about in an unkind way.

Jesus is waiting for us. He is our running buddy in this everyday race on earth to eternal life. Someone once told me that the race that we're in here on earth isn't a sprint. It's a marathon. In other words, we're not going to be able to charge full speed ahead and live a life of perfection until Jesus comes to take us to heaven. Instead, we need to take each day as it comes with the Lord beside us every step of the way through the good

times as well as the not-so-good times. He is going to give us the enduring faith in Him that we need to reach eternal life. This checklist can be a reminder that God is speaking to us and using us to do His will. Jesus is waiting for us.

May God bless all of the students, staff, parents, and congregation members with endurance to run the race He has set before us through faith in His Son, Jesus Christ.

Strategies to Control Adrenalin Surges

We have recently celebrated the 4th of July, and we're reminded of the blessings of living in America. However, our divisions and international threats can easily bring on a great deal of stress and anxiety. Moments of panic may follow. While there are many things that increase one's vulnerability to panic attacks, the root cause is an excess of adrenalin. Unfortunately, some people are much more vulnerable to those effects than others.

Fight or Flight Response

We were born with an automatic gift of *fight or flight*. When the brain recognizes a threat, it signals the release of a powerful hormone called adrenalin (epinephrine). Immediately, heart rate, pulse, blood pressure, and respiratory rate among other things will rapidly increase. Blood is moved into the muscles to prepare one to run away from the threat or fight it. That response is great when in a burning building and you need to get out. However, adrenalin and the annoying symptoms linger long after the threat dissipates.

In some people the symptoms following the adrenal surge are really uncomfortable. The heart is pounding, blood pressure is higher, and it can feel awful! The discomfort is frightening and further increases adrenalin making the annoying symptoms even worse.

Patients have described it to me like they're having a heart attack. Appropriately they head to the ER only to be told the cardiac tests were normal. It's confusing for sure. We instruct patients who have the symptoms of a heart attack to do exactly that...head to the ER to get checked.

A Review of the <u>Symptoms</u> of a Heart Attack:

--Any discomfort from the chin to the naval, into the back or the jaw or arm.

--Shortness of breath.

--Unusual fatigue, lightheadedness, cold sweat.

If you experience any of these symptoms...seek medical help immediately.

However, there are a lot of organs in these areas which can also cause similar symptoms. If the tests come back normal it's helpful to ask about a potential panic attack issue.

Panic Disorder

Panic Disorder is characterized by episodic, unexpected panic attacks that occur without a clear trigger. Panic attacks are defined by the rapid onset of intense fear (typically peaking within about 10 minutes) with at least four of the physical and psychological symptoms.

The abrupt surge can occur from a calm state or an anxious state.

- 1. Palpitations, pounding heart, or accelerated heart rate.
- 2. Sweating.
- 3. Trembling or shaking.
- 4. Sensations of shortness of breath or smothering.
- 5. Feelings of choking.
- 6. Chest pain or discomfort.
- 7. Nausea or abdominal distress.
- 8. Feeling dizzy, unsteady, light-headed, or faint.

- 9. Chills or heat sensations.
- 10. Paresthesias (numbness or tingling sensations).
- 11. Derealization (feelings of unreality) or depersonalization (being detached from oneself).
- 12. Fear of losing control or "going crazy."
- 13. Fear of dying.

No wonder people feel like they're having a heart attack.

Tips to Control Adrenalin Surges

As frustrating and frightening as panic attacks can be there are ways to shut down the adrenalin surges. It's helpful advice for all of us who are faced with a stressful event. We can learn to lower the amount of adrenalin released which will help us to maintain a healthier blood pressure, heart and brain. The trick is to stop the cycle.

- --Remind yourself what this is...an adrenalin surge and you can control it.
- --Take some slow deep breaths.
- --Get up and move.
- --Call a friend.
- --Focus on something beautiful.
- --Turn on a program you usually enjoy.
- --If you've been described medication...take it.
- --Pray for relief.
- --Speak to your spiritual advisor or a cognitive behavioral counselor.

While adrenalin works great if you need to run away from a predator, too much is a real nuisance if it's triggered by a rude person on the telephone, an argument with your spouse or worries over an ever-changing dangerous world threat. Remember that some people are simply more sensitive to adrenalin surges than other people. You're not crazy. Prayer is the most powerful antidote for me...may it be for you as well.

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Philippians 4: 6-7

When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." Matthew 9:36-38

In response to Overture 1.01 of the 2018 Iowa District East—LCMS District Convention, a district task force has been commissioned to, within the Iowa District East, to aid efforts to recruit and retain church workers in the LCMS. The synod has also launched Set Apart to Serve, an initiative of the LCMS to recruit church workers. This IDE Task force met in May, September, and November of 2022 and has developed the following vision statement:

We pray for God, through the intentional efforts of faithful mentors and ministries, to raise up and sustain wellqualified Lutheran church workers who are full of the love of God and are supported in their physical, emotional, financial, and spiritual well-being so that they may joyfully serve Christ and His church in their lifelong professional and personal vocations.

In addition, three initial goals were established: 1) Congregations, schools, ministries, families, and individuals regularly pray the Lord would send workers into the harvest; 2) All church workers view themselves as mentors; and 3) Cultivate a culture of well-supported workers. Achieving these goals will happen over time, but beginning with the Professional Packet, we hope to provide resources aimed recruiting and retaining church workers, beginning with providing prayers to be included for use in Divine service, school assemblies, classrooms, staff meetings, or at home.

This month's prayers for worship, school, and home:

Almighty and gracious God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, you have commanded us to pray that You would send forth laborers into your harvest. Of your infinite mercy, give us true teachers and ministers of Your Word and put Your saving Gospel in their hearts and on their lips that they may truly fulfill Your command and preach nothing contrary to Your holy Word, that we, being warned, instructed, nurtured, comforted, and strengthened by Your heavenly Word, may do those things which are pleasing to You and profitable to us. Northern Pastoral Conference May 12, 1942 – Vol. 61, No. 10

[extracts from article] The Northern Regional Pastors' Conference convened at Grace-Waterloo on April 7-8. Rev. Paul Barth, representing Station KFUO, appealed to the pastors to continue their support of our enlarged St. Louis station. The Rev. H.A. Roschke delivered a paper on the topic *The Principle that Determines which Commandments Are Binding upon the Christian*. **R**ev. G. Chr. Barth, Vice-President of Synod, reported on the recent meeting of the College of Presidents at St. Louis. He showed that the spiritual needs of the masses are no different in times of war than in times of peace and urged the pastors to continue to preach Christ-centered sermons. Rev. Theo. Frese continued his paper on *Exegesis of Rom. 13:11ff.* His son, the Rev. Edm. Frese delivered the next paper on *Christ's Descent into Hell, with Special Reference to the Nicene Creed.* On Wednesday afternoon, Rev. H.J. Eggold read a paper on *The Sadducees.* Rev. John Beiderwieden reported on *The Fourth Article of the Augsburg Confession.*

Teachers' Conference May 26, 1942 – Vol. 61, No. 11

[extracts from article] Teachers of the Lutheran parish schools met for their spring conference at St John-near State Center on Wednesday-Friday following Easter Sunday. Mr. George, the local teacher, conducted a lesson in *Bible History* with his pupils, treating the story *The Risen Lord*. This was followed with a demonstration lesson in *the Essentials of Government*. More papers were presented, but not listed. Dr. Henry Van Engen, head of the Mathematics Department at Iowa State Teachers' College at Cedar Falls, discussed *Building Arithmetic Concepts in the Lower Grades* and *Percentage in the Upper Grades*. Rev. C.
