With all this craziness you have to not only endure, you also get to use this month to break through all the secular nonsense of the season to tell your students what is really important.

Presents? Yes! God gave us the greatest Christmas Present anyone could ever imagine. Jesus, the Christ, ⁶ who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, ^{[b] 7} but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, ^[c] being born in the likeness of men. ⁸ And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Parish Nurse - Live Longer with three Healthy Habits

According to a new study published in "JAMA Network Open," three achievable lifestyle habits increase the chances of living to 100 years old:

3 HEALTHY HABITS:

Physical activity Never smoking A healthy diet

More precisely, exercise was associated with a 31% higher likelihood that a person would become a centenarian, followed by never smoking (25% higher chance) and then a healthy diet (23% more likely). The study involved 5,200 people with an average age of 94, and 62% of them were female. Interestingly, researchers found that while moderate alcohol use or a person's BMI didn't contribute to living to 100 years old, those two factors also didn't greatly inhibit the likelihood of living to 100 – particularly when the top three health habits were present.

The good news is that it's never too late to start making healthy lifestyle changes. Adopting the three habits at any age can have an impact on longevity and quality of life. Making the time to be physically active is the key to exercising, and as for a healthy diet, health experts recommend:

- Eating more plant-based foods such as vegetables, fruits, legumes, whole grains, seeds and nuts.
- Limiting animal meats high in saturated fats, as well as limit cheese and sugar.
- Consuming seafood two or three times per week and eat fish that is high in omega-3 or omega-6, such as salmon, sardines, herring, trout and sea bream (a "white" fish similar to sea bass).
- Choosing high fiber alternatives such as whole wheat pasta, brown rice or a potato with the skin on.
- Limit ultra-processed foods such as chips, cookies and crackers.

Lord, help us also to make the good confession in our lives as well as with our words, defending innocent babies with our words and with our actions!

The Feast of **the Annunciation of our Lord** (March 25th) is also a wonderful time to preach into the ears of God's people that our Savior Jesus was made man, not only at His birth, but 9 months prior to that at His conception! We confess in the 2nd Article of the Creed: *And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary...*

Whenever you observe Life Sunday this year, remember the murder of nearly a million tiny little unborn babies in the United States every year by elective abortion. Pray for moms, dads, babies, grandparents, friends, and neighbors, that we may speak God's Word as God gives us opportunities. Help to offer alternatives to abortion in your area. Give a special offering to Lutherans for Life. Most importantly, offer the forgiveness of every sin, including abortion, to everyone, through Jesus Christ our Savior.

In response to Overture 1.01 of the 2018 lowa District East—LCMS District Convention, a district task force has been commissioned to, within the lowa District East, to aid efforts to recruit and retain church workers in the LCMS. The synod has also launched Set Apart to Serve, an initiative of the LCMS to recruit church workers. This IDE Task force met in May, September, and November of 2022 and has developed the following vision statement:

We pray for God, through the intentional efforts of faithful mentors and ministries, to raise up and sustain well-qualified Lutheran church workers who are full of the love of God and are supported in their physical, emotional, financial, and spiritual well-being so that they may joyfully serve Christ and His church in their lifelong professional and personal vocations.

In addition, three initial goals were established: 1) Congregations, schools, ministries, families, and individuals regularly pray the Lord would send workers into the harvest; 2) All church workers view themselves as mentors; and 3) Cultivate a culture of well-supported workers. Achieving these goals will happen over time, but beginning with the Professional Packet, we hope to provide resources aimed recruiting and retaining church workers, beginning with providing prayers to be included for use in Divine service, school assemblies, classrooms, staff meetings, or at home.

This month's prayers for worship, school, and home:

Heavenly Father, we give you thanks that as your Son once came humble and mounted on a donkey, He comes to us now in humble means of Word and Sacrament. Bless Your church with faithful pastors, that through their preaching our hearts may be stirred up to say, "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord." Lord, in Your mercy, **hear our prayer.**

For an increase of church workers, that by their service more would turn their hearts to the Lord, saying, "Behold, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world," let us pray to the Lord, **Lord, have mercy.**

Dear Congregation of Iowa District East,

The time has come to prepare for the 42st District Convention of the Iowa District East on June 27-28, 2025 at the Radisson Hotel in Cedar Rapids. It is the duty and privilege of congregations and professional church workers as members of Synod to participate in the convention process. Convention information and forms may also be found at Icmside.org on the "District Convention" page in the "Events" tab. The deadline for Delegates, Nominations and Memorials is January 31, 2025.

District Convention Delegates

Each parish, whether a single congregation or a multi-congregational parish, is to be represented by two delegates, the congregation's or parish's called and ordained pastor and a layperson. Congregations of a multi-congregational parish not providing the lay delegate may also register an advisory lay delegate with voice but no vote. These delegates, an alternate lay delegate and advisory delegate if applicable are to be elected by the congregation(s) and reported to the District Office. The Delegate Credentials Form is attached. This form needs to be signed by the congregation's president and secretary. The congregation's pastor should also fill out a Delegate Characterization Form for the lay delegates.

District Presidium Nominations

Each District congregation is entitled to nominate: 1. From the Clergy Roster of the Synod two ordained pastors as candidates for District President, 2. And from the Clergy Roster of the District two ordained pastors for each of the following positions: 1st Vice President and 2nd Vice President. Presidium Ballot Forms are included in this mailing. The form shall be signed by the President and Secretary of the voting congregations and sent to the District Secretary at 14 Grove Road, Eldridge, IA 52748.

District Officer & Board Nominations

Nominations are also being solicited for officers, board and committee positions by the Nominating Committee. See the enclosed Official Notice for details.

Memorials, including recommendations of triennial mission and emphases may be submitted by congregations, boards, circuits, etc. An *Overture Template* is posted on the Convention tab of the IDE website. Again the deadline for delegates, nominations and memorials is **January 31, 2025.**

OFFICIAL DISTRICT CONVENTION NOTICE

The **42nd Convention** of the Iowa District East will be held June 27-28, 2025 at the Cedar Rapids Radisson. Rev. Dr. Joel Biermann will present on the convention theme "The Authority of the Word: The Word Walks Us Through Life, Psalm 119:105."

Each voting parish (an individual congregation or multiple congregations served by one called and ordained pastor) is entitled to have one pastoral delegate and one lay delegate. A congregation that is part of a multi-congregation parish, other than the congregation supplying the voting lay delegate, may elect and depute an advisory lay delegate with voice but no vote. The delegates' names (as well as the alternates and advisory) should be selected and submitted prior to the <u>January 31</u>, <u>2025 deadline</u>. The business of the Convention will include elections and actions on overtures. The following offices will be filled by the Convention:

Synod Committee for Convention Nominations

- One layperson (2026 Synod Convention)

- *Incumbents are eligible for re-election.

Each congregation may nominate individuals for these various positions, submit overtures concerning district or Synod business and ideas for Synod mission and ministry emphases for consideration at the convention.

The District Convention packet to be mailed by October 1, 2024 will contain information, deadlines, forms and pertinent information. This information will also be made available on the Convention page of the IDE website.

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

Pastor & teacher conferences

Northern Pastoral Conference December 3, 1946 – Vol. 65, No. 25

[extracts from article] The Northern Pastoral Conference met at Immanuel-Klinger on Oct. 22-23. It opened with a pastoral Communion service conducted by local pastor, Rev. M.F. Scheel and assisted by Rev. f. Starke of McGregor. Papers delivered and discussed: *Exegesis on Ephesians* 2 by Rev. A. Ernst of Wellsburg; *Exegesis on Numbers* 21:4-9 by Rev. Theo. Eickelberg of St. Ansgar; *Doctrine of the Eternal Election of Grace* by Rev. I.G. Kitzmann of Osage; *Sermon Study on the Transfiguration of Christ-Luke* 9:28-36 by Rev. K.J. Baumgart of State Center; *Doctrinal Content of the Beatitudes* by Rev. W.G. Nagler of Sumner. Rev. W.D. Oetting of Waterloo led a discussion on *Sola Scriptura* the first of the *Guidelines* prepared for study by the faculties of our seminaries. *A Statistical Study of Christian Education in the Iowa District East* was led by Rev. J. Schliepsiek of Hubbard. In the presence of Prof. O.H. Theiss of the International Walther League office, time was spent discussing the workings of the Walther League in the local congregations.

Teachers' Conference December 17, 1946 – Vol. 65, No. 26

[extracts from article] The regular fall conference of the teachers of the Christian parish schools in Iowa District East was held at Trinity-Davenport on Oct. 23-25. During the conference the teachers were given an insight into the following papers: Efforts Toward Lutheran Union by Rev. P. Burgdorf of Clinton; History of Mormonism by Rev. A. Starke of Davenport; Résumé of the Beginning Teacher by Miss Johannes; My Participation in Conferences by Mr. L.W. Fischer; Putting Our Schools on a Business Basis by Mr. F.L. Strieter, a local businessman. The values, uses, and materials for visual instruction were presented by a representative of Concordia Publishing House. The principal speaker of the conference, Dr. A.V. Mauer, professor at Concordia Teachers College, River Forest, Ill., made observations in the field of modern education.

Northern Pastoral Conference May 6, 1947 – Vol. 66, No. 9

[extracts from article] The brethren of the Northern Pastoral Conference assembled on April 15 and 16 for their annual spring conference at St Paul-Latimer. Forty pastors were in attendance. The following essays and discussions took place: *Translation and Explanation of Ephesians*

2:21ff by Pastor A. Ernst; The Pastor as Pivot in the Each-One-Reach-One Program by President C. Hesse; Preaching Mission by H.J. Heilmann; W.D. Oetting pleading for a maximum effort in the Centennial Thanksoffering; A filmstrip and slide projector demonstration on Trends in Modern Education by J. Schliepsiek; Explanation of Psalm 23 directly from the Hebrew original by H. Roschke; Is Our Attitude Toward Prayer Fellowship Legalistic? by E. Weiss; and The Modern Divorce Problem in the Lutheran Church by W. Tolson.

Teachers' Conference June 3, 1947 – Vol. 66, No. 11

[extracts from article] Conference was held by the teachers of the Iowa district East on April 10 to 11, at St John-Clinton. The following papers were read and discussed: *Social Psychology of Childhood* by E.G. Handrich of Readlyn; *Trends in Education* by Mr. P. Norris of the Iowa Board of Education; *Freemasonry* by Dr. Theo. Dierks of Morrison, Ill.; *Juvenile Delinquency* by W.G. Horn of Homestead. President C. Hesse answered the questions: *Why Are We Living?* and *Why Are We Christian Educators?* The Secretary of Christian Education, the Rev. John Schliepsiek, addressed the assembly on *Trends of Influence of the Past and Present in Church, School, and Home.* The District Secretary of Young People's Work, Teacher Arnold Will, reported on the recent conference on *Youth Work* held in Chicago. Topics discussed during the round-table sessions were: (1) *Educational Displays*; (2) *Greater Missions in Our Schools*; (3) *Valuation of the Sunday School, the Saturday School, and Especially the Vacation Bible School.* Mr. Zeddies spoke in behalf of the Lutheran Educational Association and as representative salesman for all types of visual aids. The following officers were elected: President, H.W. Albrecht of Atkins; vice-president, E.J. Studt of Waterloo; secretary, E.G. Handrich of Readlyn; treasurer, W.G. Horn of Homestead.

Southern Pastoral Conference December 2, 1947 – Vol. 66, No. 24

[extracts from article] The fall sessions of the Southern Pastoral Conference were held on Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 14 and 15, at St Paul-Bennett. The conference opened with a communion service in which Pastor R.E. Baldwin of Ottumwa preached the sermon on Luke 20:21. During the conference the following papers were presented: *Exegesis of Psalm 72* by H. Maas; *The Doctrine of the Church According to Article VII of the Augsburg Confession* by J. Choitz; *Micah and His Times* by Theo. Hinck; *The Beginning of the Missouri Synod in Iowa* by P. Happel; Review of *The Church and Organized Movements* by Edm. Frese; *Exegesis of Ephesians 1* by E.W.M. Brewer; *Abnormal Psychology* by A. Koch; *Archaeological Discoveries in Palestine* by A. Starke; *Sermon Delivery* by H.C. Wolters; and *The Pastor's Reading* by J. Bertram.

Registration
