President's Piece for Peace

April 25

Our regional Council of President's meeting is held each Spring in Sioux Falls S.D. At this meeting President Terry Forke of Montana was going to present a paper on "truth." Unfortunately, he had a funeral to conduct so he was not able to attend the COP meeting. So, he sent me his paper and asked me to present it to the group. It is never an easy task to present someone else's work, especially when they are of the brilliant caliber of a Terry Forke.

The paper was so thorough and informative, I thought I would share a few of his golden nuggets with you all. He begins by evaluating the many approaches to truth used in academia today. I will only list them: Correspondence theory, Pragmatic theory, Scientific theory, Private theory and Mystical theory. All of which are of human origin and process that ultimately are "subject to change." That is the fundamental problem with human oriented notions of truth.

Truth is not, nor can it be, of human origin if it wants to have any credibility at all. In fact, anything of human origin is not of divine truth, it is falsehood (which is the opposite of truth.) Truth cannot be founded on human reason and observation for 4 reasons. 1. Our powers of observation are damaged by sin. 2. Our reason is damaged by sin. 3. We have not received a promise from God that we will be able to know His creation as it really is. 4. We are particularly susceptible to the attacks of Satan.

The foundation of truth is and only is Christ Jesus Himself. No less than 28 times in the Gospel of John alone

Jesus says, "I tell you the truth." He tells the truth because He is the truth. Nothing false ever did or could come from His mouth. He is the eternal Son of God; "the Way, the Truth, and the Life." Jesus is the Word of God. Since He is the Word, and He is truth, the Holy Scriptures are the truth, our truth now and forever.

It is not unusual that I run into situations (usually of complaint against someone) that someone just wants a chance to tell me "their truth." What that means is they want a chance to speak

against someone without there being any chance of rebuttal or correction. I wonder how that notion of truth meshes with Matthew 18:15 that directs us to meet with anyone, and initially with them alone, of whom we have complaint? It doesn't.

There is no "my truth." Truth is not subjective, it is objective. The source of truth is the Word of God in all of Its divine authorship. It is that truth that sets us free. "Thy Word is truth" says the Scriptures. Whose word? God's Word revealed in Jesus Christ.

This paper is a masterpiece with so much more in it than I have revealed in this article. President Forke directs us away from ourselves and into the objective reality that can only be known because God reveals it for the sake of Truth guiding, directing, and saving our lives from the consequence of sin and death. In the Truth we have Life, and we have it to the full.

God keep us in the Truth for it is credible and trustworthy.

(bah-da bah-da-da-da)* Monday, Monday!

April 25

When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. ² Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb.

Mark 16:1,2

If you were around in 1966 (yes, some of us were) you heard the hit song by The Mamas and The Papas entitled "Monday Monday". You might want to check this song out on the internet. It is quite catchy.

Mondays....Oh those Mondays. The song declares: Monday "Won't go away" and what it brings is "here to stay." Though the song is about a man whose girl leaves him on a Monday, many people who have a Monday through Friday job, hate Monday mornings because it means grudgingly going back to work.

Monday means the weekend is over and when our alarms go off (the one in our head or the one on the nightstand) it means time to get up and get at 'em. For this is the first day of the work week.



On their first day of the week, when everyone got back into their normal routine, the two Mary's and Salome got up early, just after sunrise Mark tells us, to accomplish a very unpleasant task. They traveled to the tomb to better prepare our Lord's lifeless body for the sleep of death. Oh, sure, Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus, actually buried Jesus. Nicodemus brought a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-five pounds, and Joseph wrapped our Lord's body with strips of cloth and these spices. Then they rolled a stone against the entrance of the tomb.

But this was a rush burial. Now that Passover was over the women came back "to do it right". Not a fun task for the first day of the week, but it had to be done.

Okay, we all know the surprise these three devout women experienced and how that surprise changed everything and everyone.

But still ... you have Mondays. Every seven days you have a Monday. And for the most part they aren't fun. As the song says "Monday 'Won't go away' and what it brings is 'here to stay.'"

What does your Monday bring? All those papers that need grading, or at least reviewing, still piled on your desk, where you left them last Friday afternoon, as you were so eager to "get out of here and start the weekend". OR those smiling mischievous faces of a special few who are all charged up from two days off, ready to exhibit their creative pranks for another five days? OR that lonely child, you alone know what she is going through because she confided in you and you promised to check in with her and keep her in your prayers. Yes, it is true, Monday "Won't go away" and what it brings is "here to stay."

So let's go back to Mark 16. What did Monday bring to those three devoted women? That's right! The joy of Easter! The joy of life! The joy that this world isn't "the end" of anything! The joy and honor of being the first to carry the greatest message the world every has or ever will hear! The joyful message "He Lives! He has risen from the Dead!" That joy is "here to stay".

SUFFERING AND THE RESURRECTION

Believing And Speaking The Resurrection Into Our Suffering

Tucked into Paul's second letter to the Corinthians are two verses of profound significance for Christians journeying through affliction and suffering. They're worth memorizing. Paul writes,

Since we have the same spirit of faith according to what has been written, "I believed, and so I spoke," we also believe, and so we also speak, knowing that he who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and bring us with you into his presence (2 Corinthians 4:13-14).

Looking To God's Promises In Our Suffering

The Apostle Paul reaches back into this text and pulls it into his present context (thereby showing us how to lasso Scripture and bring it into our contexts). Paul had experienced great affliction (see the verses referenced below) and he found solace and solidarity in the confessed faith of the saints who had gone before him. What's happening here is really important to appreciate. Paul is showing us that Christ-confessors (i.e. Christians) share the same faith as the Old Testament saints. We worship the same God, confess the same Lord, and we celebrate the same promises. The only difference is that the Old

Testament saints looked forward to the fulfillment of God's promises in Christ. We look back to them (even as we too look forward to those yet to be fulfilled in the Last Day resurrection).

Paul begins his letter to the Corinthians by sharing the severity of the suffering he and his companions had endured:

For we do not want you to be unaware, brothers, of the affliction we experienced in Asia. For we were so utterly burdened beyond our strength that we despaired of life itself. Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death (2 Corinthians 1:8-9).

It was so bad that they despaired of life. Maybe you've been there. You've gone through deep affliction or dark suffering. Perhaps you're going through it now – a betrayal, a diagnosis, a tragedy, a financial blow, a mental break. What do you do when the darkness comes? That's the question Paul is answering.

Confidence In Christ In Our Suffering And Resurrection

So he writes, "Since we have the same spirit of faith according to what has been written, 'I believed, and so I spoke,' we also believe, and so we also speak..." In other words, because we share the same faith as God's Old Testament saints, we make the same bold confession of confidence in our Lord. What is Paul's confession?

[We know] that he who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and bring us with you into his presence.

Paul is shining the blazing light of God's Gospel promise in Jesus into his darkest moments and encouraging us to do likewise. He's saying, "Here, friend, bring this light into your shadowy sorrows. It will give you hope." So he confidently asserts, "We know..." He doesn't say, "We hope, we wish, we think this might be the case." He says, "We know." Just like the psalmist, Paul is speaking confidently of God's goodness and of his certainty in God's saving actions. And Paul sees those saving actions clearly displayed in the resurrection of Jesus and its implications for us...

A Great Reunion Coming

But look what Paul adds to it. He is confident that when God raises him and the Corinthian Christians (and us), that God is going to "bring us with you into his presence." There's so much hope packed into this! In addition to being raised in imperishable, glorified, powerful, and Holy Spirit empowered bodies (see 1 Corinthians 15:42-44), Paul is confident that God is going to bring believers together. In other words, there's a great reunion coming!

Those who have confessed Christ and have been separated by death are going to be reunited. Parents, children, spouses, siblings, friends – we are going to be reunited – and Jesus is going to be there with us. Having been a pastor for over 20 years, I have stood at the graveside and wept with many dear families. We have grieved our dead together, but think about what Paul is saying: In the resurrection we will be able to celebrate our reunion together! Doesn't this make your heart soar with hope?

Identity In The Resurrection

But there's another promise baked into Paul's confident confession of Christ. Look at his pronouns: *us* and *you*. Paul has specific people in mind, people he knew personally and cared about. Here's why that's important: God isn't going to raise generic, identity-less people. He's going to raise specific people who have confessed Christ, people you know, people for whom you care deeply.

Here's the point: Paul is assuming our identities are retained in the resurrection. You are going to be you forever. Your loved ones are going to be your loved ones forever. The things that make you unique and beautiful and the things that make your loved ones unique and beautiful will be redeemed and be shot through with the glory of God. In the resurrection we won't lose our identities – we will lose our sin nature! – but our identities will be retained even as they are glorified and made more beautiful by Christ.

This is the promise Paul is exhorting us to lasso into our present darkness. He knows exactly how deep the darkness can get – he was there! – but he also knows that because Jesus has risen from the dead and is coming back to raise us too, the darkness is not eternal. Life and light in Christ are. This is why Easter means so much to us. It is God's emphatic declaration and promise that He has and will banish the darkness and bless us with life and light forever. Believe and speak this into your suffering. – Pastor Conner

10 Ways To Welcome A Church Worker

The new pastor and his wife arrived to their first church located in a rural area. They were met by the church president, who explained to the pastor that the congregation had wanted to paint the inside of the parsonage, but they also had to get into the fields for early planting. The president then added, "Maybe this works better because now you and your wife can select the colors you want."

After a couple of days, the pastor called the church president and asked, "My installation is a week away and we have some extra time. Maybe my wife and I could do some of the painting ourselves?" The church leader agreed and told them to go to the local hardware store and charge everything to the church.

The next day the pastor contacted the church president and asked, "We picked up the paint and supplies, but the ceilings are very tall, does the church have anything we can use?" The church leader replied, "Yes, in the church basement there are some sawhorses and in the garage are some boards, they would work for you."

Unfortunately, the church leader didn't tell the pastor that there were sawhorses that the ladies used for their quilting work and there were old sawhorses in the storage room. The sawhorses used by the ladies were out in the open, and that's what the pastor used, and sadly they ended up with paint on them.

Two years later, some elders called on a lady member of the church who hadn't attended church or anything led by the new pastor. When the elders called on her, she responded by saying, "Anyone who would ruin our church property like he did has no business in the ministry."

This true story illustrates how a bad beginning can create difficulty in a church worker's ministry. What could that congregation have done differently? What could any church do to help make a church worker's ministry begin on a more positive note? Here are ten ways to welcome a new church worker.

1. Clear communication between pastor/church worker and congregation is critical.

Continual conversations between pastor and church leadership, plus church leadership needs to keep church members informed on what is happening concerning pastor/church worker's arrival, installation service, and other related items. Clear communication is essential.

- 2. Don't assume the pastor or church worker automatically knows everything about the church's traditions, history and customs that have been going on for decades.
- 3. If the church has a parsonage/teacherage, make sure the place is ready for them on day one.

This includes making sure appliances, furnace, and air conditioner are working or replaced if necessary. Having the house completely cleaned and any painting done before the church worker arrives. (The worker can change colors later if they want.)

4. Create a church worker support team.

This group should include at least one or two church elders, and two other members who are concerned about the overall welfare of the pastor/church worker and their family. A good description of this group can be found in *Holding Up the Prophet's Hand: Supporting Church Workers* by Dr. Bruce Hartung.

5. Welcome the new church worker with gift cards to local restaurants and grocery stores.

Instead of a food shower, have members give gift cards or cash gifts that allow the church worker to try some of the local restaurants and stores.

6. Have someone in the congregation give the pastor/church worker a tour of the community.

This tour can include the church worker's family and end with a meal at a local hang out or maybe a nice picnic at the local park.

7. In the first few months of the pastor/church worker's arrival, take time to stop by the office for a short visit in order to introduce yourself.

Consider inviting the pastor/church worker to your own home for a visit, or take them out for coffee or lunch. One might even consider inviting the church worker and their family over for a nice dinner or backyard barbecue.

8. Respect boundaries established by pastor/church worker and their families.

Supper time, evening hours, and days off are to be respected and protected by the congregation. (Only in case of an immediate emergency should one contact the church worker.) Allowing the pastor/church worker time with family will benefit the church worker and the congregation. If the parsonage belongs to the congregation that does not entitle any member including church leaders to stop by and invade the home. Proper respect includes setting up a time with the family for a visit or if repairs are needed.

9. Talk to them, not about them.

When the church worker/pastor does or says something that seems odd, before one speaks poorly about them (like the lady condemning the pastor over his use of sawhorses) take time to visit with them about the issue and share your concerns. In the 8th commandment, Luther says:

"We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way."

When something good is happening in the church, share your joy with the church worker/pastor. If the church worker or their family experience a blessing (like their oldest child scoring the winning touchdown) take the time to congratulate them. If you like the sermon, tell the pastor. Church workers need words of encouragement just like everyone else.

10. Participate and Pray!

Participating in worship services, Bible studies and church activities is a great way of showing support to the workers God has called to serve the congregation. It is also a great way to grow in one's relationship with our Lord and with fellow members. **Praying for those God has called to share the Good news of salvation in Jesus Christ is one of the joyful services all members can do!**
